On January 26, 1962, Joseph L. Bard, Attorney, 1026 Plymouth Building, Minneapolis, Minnesota, advised that he was then attorney for Ernest Goldblatt and Jay Goldman, owners of the Triangle Manufacturing Company, Minneapolis, Minnesota, which company then made jackpot boards, punch boards and paper novelties. Mr. Bard stated that the Triangle Manufacturing Company had decided to discontinue shipping any merchandise out of the State of Minnesota until a conclusion could be reached with the U. S. Department of Justice regarding the legality of such shipments.

On April 10, 1964, Mr. Bard was reinterviewed at which time he advised that the Triangle Manufacturing Company of Minneapolis had dissolved and ceased operations about October, 1962. Ernest Goldblatt has since bought into a salvage company located in Minneapolis. Jay Goldman is not known to be in any business operation at present. He has had several severe heart attacks and is more or less retired.

Mr. Bard stated further that neither Goldblatt, Goldman, nor the Triangle Manufacturing Company of Minneapolis, Minnesota, had ever had any business connections with companies outside of Minnesota. Specifically, Bard stated, there was no connection between the Triangle Manufacturing Company of Minneapolis and the Triangle Manufacturing Company of Oshkosh, Wisconsin.

On April 10, 1964, [REDACTED] Dun and Bradstreet, Inc., 25th and Park Avenue, Minneapolis, Minnesota, advised that his records show that the Triangle Manufacturing Company of Minneapolis, Minnesota, had gone out of business in October, 1962. This company had engaged in the manufacture of paper novelty items, punch boards and similar items from 1948-62. The file contained no information indicating any out-of-state connections or branches.

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
