Dear Mr. Hoover:

In the Clements report of June 26, 1964, Mr. William Downey has reported that George Senator called him about a half-hour before it was known that Ruby had shot Lee Oswald and offered to make breakfast for Downey and his wife. According to Downey, Senator also said that he was alone at Ruby's apartment. Please re-interview Mr. Senator and ask him why he called Downey after Ruby left and why he offered to make breakfast for Downey but did not eat with Ruby earlier in the morning when Ruby had a full breakfast in the apartment.

Please also ask Mr. Senator whether or not Jack Ruby said anything to Senator on Sunday morning about intending to shoot Lee Oswald. Ruby has told a member of the Commission staff that he decided to shoot Oswald at 9:15 Sunday morning and has given further testimony that Senator may have been aware of such intent.

Mr. Senator was last known to be employed at a Delicatessen at 120 W. 49th Street, New York City, known as Mr. Kishka, and can also be contacted through his sister, Mrs. A. J. Weisberg, 2255 Grand Concourse, Bronx, New York.
