DEROSTUS MC COLLOUGH/MILES was interviewed at his residence, 984 South Normandie Avenue, Apartment Number 101, where he manages the apartment house and he furnished the following information:

He met JACK RUBY at the Carousel Club in Dallas, Texas, a week before the fair opened on October 5, 1963, which would make the meeting date with RUBY about September 28, 1963. He subsequently met with RUBY three or four times prior to October 6, 1963, when his show, "How Hollywood Makes Movies" opened at the fair. These visits occurred at the Carousel Club, were usually between 12:00 PM midnight and 2:00 AM in the morning, and would vary in duration from one to two hours. He usually had someone with him when he visited RUBY, and it was always someone affiliated with-his show. His show personnel included BOB CRAVEN, HARRY LOVEJOY, SAM DOUGHERTY, JOE RANDULLA, and MARVIN GARDNER, and one or two of these persons would accompany him when he visited RUBY at the Carousel Club.

The topic of conversation during the above mentioned meetings included show business, dogs, RUBY's bar, and his twist board. Politics were never discussed at these meetings, to the best of his recollection. He took a personal liking to RUBY and enjoyed talking to him.

He has no recollection of seeing RUBY at any time, either in Dallas or at the fair grounds prior to the opening of the show on October 6, 1953, other than the above mentioned contacts. Subsequent to the opening of the show, RUBY visited his show site three to five times. RUBY was alone upon the occasion of these visits which occurred in the morning or the afternoon, and lasted from one to two hours. During the period October 6 through October 19, he and some of his show people visited RUBY at the Carousel Club approximately seven to ten times, usually in the late evening hours. On one occasion, the entire personnel of his show hours. On one occasion, the entire personnel of his show visited the Carousel Club.

Sometime between October 1, 1963, and October 6, 1963, he visited RUBY at the Carousel Club and borrowed several items used as props for his show. One item was a three foot square mirror taken from RUBY's office and a large cooler unit about three feet square and eighteen inches in depth. Both items were obtained from RUBY at the same time and were brought to his show site by RUBY who was assisted by one of his Negro workers.

He does not recall RUBY obtaining any political radio script called "Life Line" or that RUBY ever commented on any Right Wing literature. Politics were never a topic of conversation at any of the meetings with RUBY, as best he can recall.

An itinerant worker, LARRY CRAFARD, had been working at a show located next to his show at the fair grounds but was fired from his job. He felt sorry for CRAFARD and hired him since CRAFARD appeared to need money

He felt sorry for CRAFARD and hired him since CRAFARD appeared to need money for living expenses. One night CRAFARD and another individual also employed at the fair grounds engaged in a fight and CRAFARD had several teeth knocked out. He does not know what prompted the fight and was not present at the time the fight took place. CRAFARD appeared to be an illiterate individual and an ordinary itinerant worker. He lost contact with CRAFARD when the show closed on October 19, 1963.

During his contacts with RUBY he became aware of the fact that RUBY carried a gun in a shoulder holster.

During his contacts with RUBY he became aware of the fact that RUBY carried a gun in a shoulder holster. RUBY also carried large amounts of money on his person, believed to be about \$1000 or more. He is of the opinion that RUBY tried to impress people with the idea that he was a successful business man and night club operator.

Mr. ROBERT CRAVEN, 5805 Bucknell Street, North Hollywood, California, who operates a business known both as Mr. "C" Fashions and as Superior Contracting Company, located at 407 East Pico Street, Los Angeles, California, telephone RI 9-9500, residence phone 877-7443, was interviewed, at which time he advised as follows:

He met JACK RUBY approximately one year prior to the time his show, "How Hollywood Makes Movies," opened in Dallas, Texas, on October 5, 1963. He does not recall, however, having any contact telephonically or otherwise with RUBY on September 26, 27, 28, or 29, 1963. He saw RUBY in Dallas, Texas, two or three days prior to the opening of the show on October 5, 1963. The place of their meeting was the Dallas fairgrounds and RUBY continued to visit the Dallas fairgrounds practically every day during the fair and usually visited CRAVEN's show. He cannot remember the exact days or times of

practically every day during the fair and usually visited CRAVEN's show. He cannot remember the exact days or times of RUBY's visits but remembers that on the days he was at the fair it was usually during the afternoon.

CRAVEN visited RUBY's night club in Dallas on several occasions while there but cannot remember the exact dates. He does not recall RUBY ever having any radio scripts called "Life-Line" or any political literature in his possession. He said RUBY did not comment on any right-wing literature being distributed at the Dallas fair by H. L. Hunt or other conservative groups. tive groups.

CRAVEN recalled that they hired "LARRY" CRAFARD when he came to their show requesting a job. He said RUBY did not know CRAFARD prior to the time he was hired by CRAVEN, but that he met CRAFARD during the fair. He said he had no reason to question CRAFARD's activities in any way while he was employed by them.

CRAVEN stated that RUBY did not invest any money in their show, "How Hollywood Makes Movies."

Mrs. LAURA A. BYRUM, 6039 Singing Hills Drive, employed as the manager of the Pago Club, 2822 McKinney Avenue, Dallas, Texas, advised she is a casual acquaintance of JACK RUBY.

Mrs. BYRUM stated that on Saturday night, November 23, 1963, JACK RUBY entered the Pago Club alone. Mrs. BYRUM stated RUBY was seated at a table near the front of the club by waitress VIRGINIA THOMPSON HUMPHRIES. who is now employed as a waitress at the Capri Lounge, 2000 3913 Cedar Springs, Dallas, Texas. Mrs. BYRUM advised RUBY sat alone at the table and spoke to no one. RUBY ordered a plain Coke and sipped on this Coke for about thirty minutes. At this time, BOB/NORTON, owner of the Pago Club, approached RUBY, and Mrs. BYRUM/stated RUBY and NORTON exchanged / State greetings.

Mrs. BYRUM stated that during the time RUBY was seated alone at the table, she (Mrs. BYRUM) passed by RUBY's table and said, "Hi, JACK." RUBY exchanged the greeting and commented that the Pago Club had a "nice crowd."

Mrs. BYRUM stated that RUBY has never mentioned the name LEE HARVEY OSWALD and she knows of no association between OSWALD and RUBY.

Mrs. HUMPHRIES stated she was formerly employed as a waitress at the Pago Club, 2822 McKinney Avenue, Dallas, Texas.

Mrs. HUMPHRIES recalled that on Saturday night,
November 23, 1963, at approximately midnight, JACK RUBY entered
the Pago Club alone. She seated RUBY at a table near the middle
of the club. RUBY ordered a plain Coke. Upon being served the
Coke, RUBY asked, "Why are you open?" According to Mrs. HUMPHRIES,
RUBY asked this question as though it were a sacrilege to be open.
Mrs. HUMPHRIES stated she said, "Ask my employer," in answer to
RUBY's question and she then walked away from RUBY's table, having
no further conversation with him.

Mrs. HUMPHRIES related that a few minutes had passed by when she observed BCB NORTON, owner of the Pago Club, sit down and join RUBY at RUBY's table. NORTON called Mrs. HUMPHRIES over to the table and he also ordered a plain Coke. Mrs. HUMPHRIES served NORTON the Coke. She had no further conversation with either of the men and has no knowledge as to the nature of the conversation between them.

Mrs. HUMPHRIES further advised at approximately 1:00

AM, on November 24, 1963, she was getting her "tabs" ready for her customers to pay, as 1:00 AM was the club's closing time. She observed RUBY was not at his table and had apparently left without paying his tab. Mrs. HUMPHRIES did not see RUBY leave the club and does not know how long he remained in the club after she served NORTON at RUBY's table. She locked around the club for RUBY, but could not find him. NORTON was still in the club, but RUBY was not. Mrs. HUMPHRIES stated she then gave RUBY's tab to the Club Manager, Mrs. IAURA BYRUM, stating she was not going to pay for another club owner's tab. ROBERT L. NORTON, 3414 Manana Street, Dallas, Texas, owner of the Pago Pago Club (formerly known as the Pago Club), 2822 McKinney Avenue, Dallas, was interviewed at his place of residence.

NORTON stated that on Saturday night, November 23, 1963, he had given \$50.00 in cash to JACK L. RUBY at the Pago Club prior to RUBY leaving the club that night.

Concerning this \$50.00, NORTON gave the following explanation regarding his giving RUBY this money:

NORTON stated that some months earlier in 1963, approximately fifteen owners of different commercial night clubs in the Dallas area had formed a group known as the "Dallas Association of Clubs and Loungas" with the purpose of accumulating a small treasury to enable the owners to have a fund to conduct credit checks, locate bad check passers, and, in general to perform different acts to improve the operations of the clubs and lounges and create a better impression of the club owners in the minds of the local citizens.

NORTON stated that he was elected the first President of this group, which did not have any office space as such.

While the organization had good intentions at first, the few members lost interest and the group decided to fold. However, during the short time the association was in existence, it had accumulated around \$400.00 in its treasury.

MORTON stated that JACK RUBY was not an official member of the Association, but at one time he had been given some tickets to sell for a special party given by the Association. The money from the sale of all tickets by the group was to go to the Association's treasury. As NORTON recalls, RUBY was not at the party and did not turn in his money for the tickets or return any tickets.

At that time, the new President and Vice President of the group went to RUBY to get the money for these tickets and RUBY apparently became displeased with their approach and told them he would not give them any money for the tickets. The President then went to see NORTON to tell him about RUBY's refusal to give them any money, but prior to his arrival, RUBY called NORTON and explained to him about the visit of the new Association President; that he had been rude to him as he, RUBY, was tied up with other business matters at the time of the President's visit, and that he (RUBY) was sorry and would give NORTON the money in a few days.

NORTON stated that about two weeks later, RUBY gave him 850.00 for the party tickets. NORTON told RUBY that the group had decided to dissolve, and that he would probably get his \$50.00 back.

The Association subsequently held a meeting of the membership, which was advertised in the paper, at which meeting it was decided to disband the organization and split up the some \$400.00 which was still in the treasury. NORTON did not attend the meeting, but he learned that the group had voted not to give RUBY a share of the money to be divided as the members did not consider RUBY to be officially a member of the Association.

NORTON stated that he received \$48.00 as his part of the division of the treasury. He felt personally that RUBY should also have been given a share of the group's division, of money as RUBY had just recently given the organization the \$50.00 for tickets to the last party; but inasmuch as the organization had voted who were and were not eligible for the treasury split, RUBY was not entitled to any funds from the group.

NORTON stated that since he had told RUBY that he would probably get his \$50.00 back, he felt morally responsible to see that RUBY id receive his \$50.00 back from the organization.

NORTON stated that it was this \$50.00 that he gave RUBY on Saturday night, November 23, 1963, at the Pago Club. He stated that the sum was actually \$50.00 and not \$25.00 or any other sum. NORTON does not recall just what type of bills he used in paying RUBY, but he believes it was in fives, tens and possibly twenties.

NORTON stated that he does not believe that RUBY hadcome to the Pago Club the night of November 23, 1963, to obtain
this money from him, but NORTON felt that inasmuch as RUBY was
in the club, it was a good time to pay him what he, NORTON,
felt was justly owed to RUBY by the Association.

ROY WILLIAM PIKE, also known as Mickey Ryan, Mike Pike, was located at Stockton Quincy Ford, Inc.; 1522 Westwood Boulevard, Los Angeles, California, telephone BR 04108, where he is employed as a car salesman under the name of MIKE PIKE. PIKE stated he presently lives at 1138 Euclid Avenue, Apartment 2, Santa Monica, California, and his residence phone is 395-5116. PIKE advised as follows:

He first met JACK RUBY approximately one year prior to November 22, 1963, when he was standing outside RUBY's night club in Dallas, Texas, looking at the poster photographs of the strip-teasers who were then appearing at RUBY's club. He was approached by RUBY, who asked him if he would like to see the show as his guest. He accepted RUBY's invitation and was later that day offered a job as RUBY's bookkeeper. He worked for RUBY for approximately two months until he left Dallas to take a job in Fort Worth, Tex as, as a car salesman. During the two months he was employed by RUBY he attended a few parties with RUBY.

He is of the opinion that RUBY was conducting a strictly legitimate business, had no association with the underworld or the Communist Party. He said RUBY liked to give people the impression he was a "tough customer" and liked to surround himself with well-dressed, clean-cut men because it made him feel important.

After leaving Dallas to work in Fort Worth, he occasionally visited RUEY's club in Dallas, where he had dates with some of the girls working for RUBY. The girls he dated most were his present wife and another stripper, whose name he cannot recall but who is presently living with CULLEN BRIGGS. a retired District Judge in Corpus Christi, Texas.

He was watching television with RAMONA/WAGNER, also known as Tuesday Ryan (his wife from whom he is presently seeking a divorce), on November 22, 1963, when he heard a news flash that President KENNEDY had been shot. He does not recall exactly what his activities were on November 23, 1963, but does remember that he was watching television with his wife on November 24, 1963, when LEE HARVEY OSWALD was shot. He

definitely did not see RUBY on November 22, 23, or 24, 1963. He was working as a bartender at the North Park Inn, Dallas, Texas, during this period of time and was always home during the day. He does not recall meeting RUBY at the Carousel Club on November 21, 1963. He believes he last saw RUBY approximately two weeks prior to November 22, 1963. He said he also believes that he last saw GEORGE SELATOR, RALPHI PAUL, HARRY OLSEN, "KATHY KAY" COLE AN, KAREN BEHHETTE GARLIN, also known as "Little LYHM," BEUCE CARLIN, TAMMIE TRUE, BRECK WALL, and JOE PATTERSON approximately two weeks prior to November 22, 1963. He is positive he did not see these individuals on November 22, 23, or 24, 1963.

His decision to leave Dallas, Texas, on approximately
November 30, 1963, was prompted by a fight which he had had
with his wife and not by any actions of RUBY or by any connections
which he, PIKE, had had with RUBY.

He never made any long-distance telephone calls from the Carousel Club and he is positive that RUBY never made any long-distance calls from his, PIKE's, phone.

He considered RUBY to be emotionally unstable because he displayed a violent temper on occasions and because of the fact that he liked to surround himself with clean-cut, well-dressed, "Hollywood-type" men to make himself feel important. He never knew LEE HARVEY OSWALD and believes that RUBY was not acquainted with OSWALD.
