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Mr. PIERPOINT also stated that he has no independent knowledge of reproducing any documents pertaining to a Polygraph examination given to Mr. RUBY in Dallas, Texas, by representative of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. He stated that he is of the opinion that he did reproduce copies of documents pertaining to this.

In conclusion, Mr. PIERPOINT stated he had never disclosed any information from the Commission files to anyone and he has no knowledge concerning the identity of anyone, whether a Commission member or employee, having disclosed any information to any unauthorized individual. He stated he does not know DOROTHY KILGALLEN and has never seen her in person. He commented, of course, he has seen her on television.

DOUGLAS PRATHER, 1010 Columbia Road, N. W., Washington, D. C. advised that he is employed by the Commission as a Messenger. He delivers sealed envelopes containing various documents to members of the Commission as well as to other officials or offices of the United States Government. He stated that since the envelopes are sealed, he is not aware of their contents or the nature of the documents contained therein except they pertain to the work of the Commission.

Mr. PRATHER advised he has never disclosed any information from files of the Commission to any unauthorized individual nor is he aware of anyone who has. Mr. PRATHER added that he is not acquainted with DOROTHY KILGALLEN although he is aware she appears on TV.

Miss CAROLYN SCHWEINSBERG, 2001 Columbia Road, N.W., advised she is a telephone operator and a clerk-typist with the President's Commission on the Assassination of President Kennedy. She has been so employed since January 29, 1964.

With regard to the unauthorized publication of the polygraph examination of JACK L. RUBY in "The Dallas Times Herald" on July 22, 1964, Miss SCHEINSBERG said she has not ever read the testimony, did not divulge it to any unauthorized person and does not know who may have furnished it to a newspaper reporter. She said she has never been in Dallas, Texas, and is not acquainted with FELIX R. MC KNIGHT, Executive Vice President and Editor of "The Dallas Times Herald," nor anyone else on that paper.

With regard to the unauthorized publication of the complete testimony of JACK L. RUBY before Chief Justice EARL WARREN on June 7, 1964, which appeared in the "New York Journal-American" on August 18, 1964, under the by-line of DOROTHEA KILGALLEY, Miss SCHEINSBERG advised she has not read the testimony of RUBY before Chief Justice WARREN and she certainly did not make it available to DOROTHEA KILGALLEY. Furthermore, she has no idea who may have disclosed the information or made a copy of the testimony available to KILGALLEY. She said she is not personally acquainted with KILGALLEY, JOSEPH KINGSBURY-SMITH, Publisher of the "New York Journal-American," or any other person on that newspaper.

Miss SCHEINSBERG advised that with regard to the unauthorized publication of the testimony of JACK L. RUBY before Chief Justice WARREN on June 7, 1964, which appeared in "The Dallas Morning News" on June 27, 1964, she has no knowledge as to the source of the information for the newspaper. She said she did not personally disclose such information nor does she know who did. She is not acquainted with CARL FREUND, a reporter, or anyone else connected with "The Dallas Morning News".

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Miss SCHWEINSBERG said she has no knowledge concerning the duplication of copies of testimony received by the Commission nor does she have knowledge concerning the internal distribution of them.

In connection with her duties as a phone operator she explained it is possible to make outgoing local phone calls without going through the switchboard, so many made by staff members do not come to her attention. She can recall no incoming calls from DOROTHY KILGALLEN, nor does she know of any staff or Commission member ever attempting to phone DOROTHY KILGALLEN.

 Commission Offices.

She stated she is employed as a Staff Secretary for the Commission. She takes dictation from various staff members of the Commission and performs any other duties of a clerical nature assigned to her.

She denied ever having disclosed any information from the Commission files to any unauthorized person. She has no idea how various news media obtained information concerning RUBY's testimony on June 7, 1964, or the results of the polygraph examination afforded him.

She advised she has never seen or had a transcript of RUBY's testimony or his polygraph examination. She has never read DOROTHY KILGALLEN's articles concerning RUBY's testimony in a New York newspaper. She does not know DOROTHY KILGALLEN except for having seen her on television.

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 Miss CHARLENE CARDWELL, 1360 Adams Street, N.E., Washington, D. C., a former typist for the President's Commission on the Assassination of President KENNEDY, furnished the following information regarding her employment:

Miss CARDWELL advised that she worked for the President's Commission on the Assassination of President KENNEDY from August 13, 1964, to August 25, 1964. Her place of employment was located in Room 440 of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Building, 200 Maryland Avenue, N.E., Washington, D. C.

Miss CARDWELL typed rough drafts for two attorneys whose names she could not recall. She typed testimony regarding RUBY's appearance before Chief Justice EARL WARREN on June 7, 1964. The typing was from handwritten notes and paragraphs of Xeroxed copies of the testimony.

There were four other women in the room with Miss CARDWELL. After the typing was completed Miss CARDWELL would furnish her typewritten pages to a Mr. LIEDLER (phonetic).

Miss CARDWELL never observed a complete copy of RUBY's testimony. She recalled making copies of an unknown report on a Xerox machine; however, she did not observe what the copies related to, other than the fact they were from the State Department and classified "Secret."

Miss CARDWELL also typed notices of newspaper clippings regarding the OSWALD case and recalled observing an article by DOROTHY KILGALLEN referring to the JACK RUBY testimony. However, she could not recall the newspaper nor the date that she read the article.

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Miss CARDWELL advised she did not have any reason to suspect anyone with whom she worked of furnishing any information to DOROTHY KILGALLEN.

On September 18, 1964, Miss SERRESA MINTER, 909
Evarts Street, N.E., Washington, D. C., a former typist
 for the President's Commission on the Assassination of
 President Kennedy, furnished the following information
 regarding her employment:

Miss MINTER worked for the President's Commission
 on the Assassination of President Kennedy from August 13,
 1964, to August 24, 1964, as a typist for a lawyer, LIEDLER
 (phonetic). Her place of employment was located in Room
 404 of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Building, 200 Maryland
 Avenue, N.E., Washington, D. C.

Miss MINTER's work consisted of typing rough draft
 copies of the testimony of JACK RUBY before Chief Justice
EARL WARREN on June 7, 1964.

Miss MINTER typed from Xerox copies which had
 been corrected, such as paragraphs added and deleted, the
 added paragraphs having been written in longhand by someone
 unknown to her. The Xeroxed copies of the RUBY testimony
 consisted of loose pages taken from the complete testimony.
 At no time did Miss MINTER observe the completed volume of
 the testimony. The testimony was being condensed and she
 observed approximately sixty pages reduced to twenty-five
 pages by the time she terminated her employment there.
 Miss MINTER did not know why part of the testimony was being
 deleted.

Miss MINTER worked until approximately 7:00 to
 8:00 p.m. each evening and was generally alone in the room
 prior to leaving at night. Other employees working the night
 shift were generally out to dinner at the time she left,

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thereby leaving no one in the room at that time. The night shift generally returned approximately ten to fifteen minutes after her departure. Miss MINTER would take the papers she was working on, place them in a manila folder and leave them on the corner of her desk.

The night personnel had passes in order to gain entrance to the building and a guard was on duty at the front door to the building, however, the room in which Miss MINTER worked was vacant for a period of time and the Xeroxed copies of the RUBY testimony were left unguarded during this time.

There were four other typists in the room with Miss MINTER, most of whom brought their lunch. This, therefore, did not necessitate the room being unoccupied during lunch time, at which time anyone would have access to the building.

The Xeroxed copies of the RUBY testimony did not have a classification affixed to them, however, they were maintained loosely in a folder classified "Confidential."

An unknown male brought the Xeroxed copies to her to be typed in rough draft form and when finished Miss MINTER returned them to Mr. LIEDLER's Office, Room 503.

Miss MINTER observed a New York newspaper on Thursday, August 20, 1964, which reflected RUBY's testimony before the Commission. Miss MINTER and the four other women thought that it was funny that it appeared in the newspaper while they were typing it and all of the girls laughed. The newspaper account appeared to be verbatim to the testimony.

Miss MINTER also typed Mrs. OSWALD's testimony which Mrs. OSWALD had given before the Commission. The copy of this testimony had been Xeroxed. The pages were loose and it was in a brown manila folder. Miss MINTER retyped the whole transcript.

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Miss MINTER advised she was not acquainted with anyone in the news media and did not furnish any information regarding her work with the Commission to any unauthorized person.

Miss MINTER did not have any reason to suspect anyone with whom she worked as having furnished any information to individuals not entitled to receive such information.

Miss BEATRICE WILDER was interviewed at her residence, 4507 South 34th Street, Arlington, Virginia. Miss WILDER advised that she is a secretary in the Office of the Chief of Communications-Electronics, Department of the Army, Arlington, Virginia. She explained that about June 22, 1964, she was designated on loan to the President's Commission on the Assassination of President Kennedy, and had worked in the offices of the Commission as a secretary for one week only before returning to her regular position with the Department of the Army.

Miss WILDER said that during the period she was attached to the Commission, she had worked in Room 506 at the Commission offices, 200 Maryland Avenue, N. E. she said that the area of the investigation to which she was assigned was the biography and activities of LEE HARVEY OSWALD. She said that her main duties were the typing of drafts and memoranda concerned with the proposed final report of the Commission. She said that she had little if any occasion to see and work with the transcripts of testimony of other Commission documents.

Miss WILDER said that she cannot recall ever having seen any Commission documents or having received any information from Commission sources concerning JACK RUBY, while she was in the employ of the Commission.

She said that she has never visited Dallas, Texas, and that she has never been acquainted with any person known to her to be connected with any Dallas, Texas, newspaper. She said further that she is not acquainted with DOROTHY KILGALLEN or anyone else affiliated with the "New York Journal-American" newspaper.

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Miss WILDER said specifically that she has never made available, to anyone not authorized to receive same, any information or documents which had come into her possession through her connection with the Commission. She said that she could offer no information as to how these unauthorized disclosures may have taken place, which resulted in Commission information appearing in the press.

JAMES H. PIPKIN, JR., 6409 Shadow Road, Chevy Chase, Maryland, advised he was employed on a volunteer (without pay) basis by the President's Commission on the Assassination of President Kennedy at Washington, D. C., from July 16, 1964, to August 3, 1964. He stated he had completed work at the United States Supreme Court and was in a terminal leave status when he volunteered to assist the Commission. He stated he is a recent graduate of Harvard Law School. He advised that during the brief period he assisted the Commission his duties consisted in checking the accuracy of footnotes and supplying footnotes where they were lacking. During his employment he was exclusively in Washington, D. C., and did not have occasion to go to Dallas, Texas. D.C.

Mr. PIPKIN advised that during the brief period of his association with the Commission he did not see or read the deposition obtained on June 7, 1964, from JACK L. RUBY by Chief Justice EARL WARREN. He was, of course, not present at the taking of the deposition and during his employment had no official interest in the deposition. He stated he has no idea whatever as to how the deposition came into the possession of "The Dallas Morning News," DOROTHY KILGALLEN, or the "New York Journal-American." He stated he is not acquainted with anyone associated with "The Dallas Morning News," including CARL FREUND; he is not acquainted with anyone associated with the "New York Journal-American" and, specifically, does not know and has never had any contact with DOROTHY KILGALLEN.

Mr. PIPKIN was questioned concerning his knowledge as to the publication in the July 22, 1964, issue of "The Dallas Times Herald" of an account of the polygraph test afforded JACK L. RUBY at Dallas, Texas, on July 18, 1964. He advised he never saw the polygraph examination, never read it, and has no information whatever as to who may have furnished it to "The Dallas Times Herald." He pointed out

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that during the brief period of his association with the Commission he had no official interest in or contact with the polygraph test.

Mr. PIPKIN stated he was unable to offer any suggestions whatever as to the identity of the persons responsible for any of the leaks of information mentioned herein above.

Mr. EDWARD G. GEBO, 12615 Beechfern Lane, Bowie, Maryland, advised he is an employee of the Government Printing Office (GPO) on loan to the President's Commission on the Assassination of President KENNEDY. He said his job is to assist in the preparation of Commission documents for printing by the GPO. He began duty with the Commission on May 1, 1964.

With regard to the unauthorized publication of the polygraph examination of JACK L. RUBY in the "Dallas Times Herald" on July 22, 1964, Mr. GEBO advised he did not personally divulge the contents of the transcript of the polygraph examination to any newspaperman or any other person. He said he has no idea who may have disclosed the contents to the newspaper. Mr. GEBO said he has never been in Dallas, Texas, and is not acquainted with anyone living in that city. He said he knows no one employed on the "Dallas Times Herald" nor is he acquainted with FELIX R. McKNIGHT, Executive Vice President and Editor of the "Dallas Times Herald." GEBO said he believes he has seen the transcript of the polygraph examination in connection with preparing the copy for printing but he certainly had no time to read it. He said he has no idea who may have furnished the information to the newspaper.

Concerning the unauthorized publication of the complete testimony of JACK L. RUBY before Chief Justice WARREN on June 7, 1964, which appeared in the "New York Journal American" on August 18, 1964, under the by-line of DOROTHY KILGALLEN, Mr. GEBO advised he did not furnish the information to Miss KILGALLEN nor does he know who did. He is not personally acquainted with her nor anyone else on the payroll of the "New York Journal American." He does not know JOSEPH KING RUBY-SMITH, Publisher of the "New York Journal American." Mr. GEBO said he undoubtedly had handled the copy of the RUBY interview by Chief Justice WARREN in connection with his duties, but he did not read it in its entirety. Mr. GEBO does not know anyone on the staff of the President's Commission who knows DOROTHY KILGALLEN. He has no idea how KILGALLEN may have come into possession of a transcript.

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GEBO advised that with regard to the unauthorized publication of the testimony of JACK L. RUBY before Chief Justice WARREN on June 7, 1964, which appeared in the "Dallas Morning News" on June 27, 1964, he has no knowledge as to the source of information for the newspaper. He said he did not personally disclose such information nor does he know who did. He does not know the reporter CARL FREUND nor any other employee of the "Dallas Morning News."

Mr. GEBO said he has no information concerning the number of copies which are made of testimony before the Commission nor does he have any understanding or knowledge of the internal distribution of those copies. He said such a matter was outside his province as a GPO liaison employee. He said his job is to prepare Commission documents for printing. This involves some correction of copy by him or members of his staff to be certain the Commission copy is prepared in accordance with GPO instructions. Thereafter, he forwards this material to the GPO. When a galley proof has been returned he must see that the galley proof is available for staff members to review and correct. Final corrections are once again forwarded by him to the GPO. GEBO said he started with a staff of three employees in May, 1964, but now has five men engaged in this type of work for the Commission.

Mr. CRAVER advised he is a Government Printing Office (GPO) proofreader assigned to the Commission. Although his job title is proofreader, while assigned to the Commission he does not proofread copy. His duties consist of cutting, pasting, and numbering various documents for transmittal to the GPO for printing. When the material is returned from GPO, he peruses the material for indexing.

Mr. CRAVER stated he has never disclosed to any unauthorized person any information coming to his attention at the Commission and knows of no one else who has divulged any such information.

Mr. CRAVER stated he has never met DOROTHY KILGALLEN.

Mr. WILLARD C. FLAUGH, 3006 Fairchild Drive, Alexandria, Virginia, telephone South 5-3017, advised that he is employed by the United States Government Printing Office (GPO), Washington, D. C. He was on loan as a proof reader to the President's Commission on the Assassination of President Kennedy from May 1 to July 13, 1964. DC

With regard to the unauthorized publication of the polygraph examination of JACK L. RUBY in "The Dallas Times Herald" July 22, 1964, Mr. FLAUGH advised that he had returned to the GPO July 13, 1964, and had no information concerning the polygraph transcript. He said that he personally did not have the information to divulge and suspected no one on the Commission staff or elsewhere. He said that he had never been in Dallas, Texas, and did not know anyone affiliated with "The Dallas Times Herald."

Concerning the unauthorized publication of the complete testimony of JACK L. RUBY before Chief Justice KARL WARREN on June 7, 1964, which appeared in the "New York Journal-American" on August 18, 1964, under the by-line of DOROTHY KILGALLEN, Mr. FLAUGH stated that he did not see RUBY's testimony until after he, Mr. FLAUGH, returned to the GPO. He advised that he had to proofread the transcript of RUBY's testimony at GPO for accuracy and GPO publication style. This was his only connection with RUBY's testimony.

Mr. FLAUGH stated that he certainly did not divulge any information concerning this testimony to anyone and he has no idea who may have. He remarked that he does not know DOROTHY KILGALLEN or anyone associated with the "New York Journal-American."

Mr. FLAUGH advised that he had no idea how many copies of JACK L. RUBY's testimony were made by the President's Commission. He remarked that the Commission did have a Xerox

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machine on the fifth floor of its headquarters and therefore was in a position to make reproductions of the transcript if desired. He had no information whatsoever regarding intro-Commission distribution of RUBY's transcript.

Mr. FLAUGH stated that with regard to the unauthorized publication of the testimony of JACK L. RUBY before Chief Justice WARREN on June 7, 1964, which appeared in "The Dallas Morning News" on June 27, 1964, he had no knowledge as to the source of the information for the newspaper. He advised he did not disclose such information and does not know who did. He stated that he did not know CARL FREUND or anyone affiliated with "The Dallas Morning News."
