Oswald's Family Opposed in View

The mother and brother of Lee Harvey Oswald displayed sharp contrast Sunday in their reactions to the Warren Commission report.

The mother, Mrs. Marguerite Oswald of 2220 Thomas Pl., laheled the report on the Kennedy assassination as "ridicujous," "unfair," and "full of loopholes."

She charged she had in her possession proof that could "tear the book apart," and re-affirmed her belief in the innovence of her slain son.

THE BROTHER, Robert Oswald of Wichita Falls, reacted in just the opposite vein.

in just the opposite vein.
Oswald, in interviews with
the Star-Telegram and the ABCTV network, said that there is
now no doubt in his mind that
his brother was the assassin of

resident Kennedy.
He said that in the past he had had doubts about the time fuctors—the time the shots were fired from the Texas Schoolbook Depository Building and the time that his brother left the building until his arrest in a theater.

I am quite satisfied that it has been covered entirely and leaves no doubt in my mind that Lee actually did assassinate the president of the United States and did kill Officer Tippit," sadi the 30-year-old sales manager for a brick company.

HOWEVER, he did say that he still had some doubts regarding the motive that promptad his bestber to bill Konnedy.

ed his brother to kill Kennedy.
"The commission report goes into a number of possible motives and probabilities," Oswald said. "Two or three come close to my own personal thinking about what the motive might have been."

But he did not elaborate on his "own personal thinking."

Mrs. Oswald said the essence of the lengthy report released publicly Sunday has caused her to redouble her investigation into the assassination.

"I have in my possession facts that make me believe my son is innocent," she said. "I'm going to dedicate my life to getting the truth of this matter before the American people."

The 57-year-old woman, who spent all Saturday night reading the report after it was sent to her special delivery from Washington, jumped to her feet several times during an interview to denounce passages in the book.

She said she had been "conditioned" by published accounts of what the report would contain and was not shocked.

tain and was not shocked.
"I am not bitter," she said,
"I am indignant. This is not justice."

SHE SHARPLY criticized the commission for not releasing a full report on Jack Ruby, who killed her son. The commission said its report in this area was limited in scope because the Jack Ruby case was still pending.

She also demanded to know when 28 more volumes of testimony will be released to the public, charging this was essential in order to get the "full picture of this case."

"This is just a summation,"
Mrs. Oswald said. "I, as a
mother, can not accept a sum
mation from a seven-man commission."
