Assassination Not Hard, JFK Said Of Day of Death

WASHINGTON (UPI) — On the morning of the day of his death, President John F. Kennedy remarked to an aide that it would not be a very difficult job to assassinate an American president.

White House aide P. Kenneth O'Donnell told the Warren Commission Kennedy commented that "If anybody really wanted to shoot the President of the United States, it was not a very difficult job—all one had to do was get a high building some day with a telescopic rifle, and there was nothing anybody could do to defend against such an attempt."

Upon concluding the conversation, the commission noted, "The President prepared to depart for Dallas."
