

'NO COMMENT'

Police Officials Silent

The top city and federal law enforcement officials in Dallas declined comment on Warren Commission criticism of the Dallas Police Department, the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Secret Service.

Police Chief Jesse Curry met the sharp charges that his department mishandled the protection, legal rights and interrogation of Lee Harvey Oswald with a terse:

"I'm not going to comment on any of it. We're just going to leave it the way it is."

Dallas Secret Service chief Forrest Sorrells and FBI Agent in Charge Gordon Shanklin also declined to comment on the commission report, which included a slap at a breakdown in communications between the two federal police agencies.

Report Satisfies Robert Kennedy

NEW YORK (AP) — Former Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy said Sunday he does not intend to read the Warren Commission's report on the assassination of his brother, President John F. Kennedy.

But he said he had been "briefed on it, and that he is "completely satisfied that the commission investigated every lead and examined every piece of evidence."

REPORT LACKS LEGAL BASIS

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Warren Commission's report on the assassination of John F. Kennedy actually has no legal standing at all.

Just as with any report from a presidential commission, its findings can be used as the basis for some form of regulation or law, but the report lacks the force of a congressional act, a judicial decision or an executive order.
