

Lawyer Doubts Report Proves Oswald's Guilt

NEW YORK (AP)—Mark Lane, a New York attorney who has been saying in public lectures for months that he does not believe Lee Harvey Oswald killed President John F. Kennedy, says the Warren Commission report makes him even more doubtful.

"It raises more questions than it answers," Lane, 36, told a news conference.

Lane, a former New York assemblyman, was retained without fee last January by Oswald's mother to defend him before the Warren Commission. She ended the arrangement in April.

The attorney lectured in Europe and the United States on the case, and said in London in June that the Warren Commission would "never get the facts." In Budapest, Hungary, he said Kennedy's killers are still at large, and suggested an international commission be appointed to investigate.

Called before the Warren Commission on July 1, Lane again declined to produce a tape recording he said he possessed of an interview with a woman witness to the murder of Dallas policeman D. Tippitt. The woman had told the commission she never talked to Lane.

Marina Says Lee Planned To Kill Nixon

WASHINGTON (AP) — Assassin Lee Harvey Oswald once told his wife he planned to kill former Vice President Richard M. Nixon, the Warren Commission report disclosed.

Mrs. Marina Oswald failed to mention the incident when she testified before the commission on Feb. 3-6, but was questioned in June after Oswald's brother, Robert Oswald, testified of hearing of the incident.

The Russian-born widow of the accused assassin said the incident took place a few days before Oswald's trip from Dallas to New Orleans on April 24, 1963.

Mr. Nixon was not in Dallas at the time, the report said, and there were no indications that he might visit Dallas.

Mrs. Oswald's revelation of a threat to Nixon was a surprise. She testified her husband put on a good suit, took a pistol, and told her: "Nixon is coming. I want to go and have a look." He said he would use the pistol if he had a chance.

Marina reminded him he had promised, after his boasting to her about the shot at Gen. Walker, never to repeat such an act. "I started to cry . . . I remember that I held him. We actually struggled for several minutes and then he quieted down." He did not take the weapon.
