

Evidence Listed by Commission

WASHINGTON—Here is a point-by-point run down of evidence listed in the Warren Commission report collected by the Dallas police department and other agencies in gathering information on Lee Harvey's Oswald's part in the murder of President John Kennedy.

—The 6.5-caliber Mannlicher-Carcano rifle found on the sixth floor of the Texas School Book Depository building belonged to Oswald, who purchased it through a mail order house.

—The bullets found on Gov. John Connally's stretcher and in the presidential limousine (fragments here) were identified by experts as being fired from the same Mannlicher-Carcano rifle.

—Cartridges (three) found in the sixth floor were also identified as coming from the same

rifle.

—The shots which killed President Kennedy and wounded Connally came from the sixth floor of the book depository.

—Oswald's right palmprint on the barrel of the rifle was identified by an FBI expert.

—An FBI fiber expert found cotton particles in the stock of the rifle which matched those from Oswald's shirt or one identical to it.

—Oswald carried a bulky package to work the morning of Nov. 22 wrapped in a brown paper sack.

—The same sack was found on the sixth floor after the assassination.

—Latent palmprint and fingerprint on the bag were identified as Oswald's.

—A carton by the window from which the shots were fired had Oswald's palmprints and fingerprint on it.

—Howard L. Breannan testified that Oswald was the man he saw fire the shots from the 6th-floor window. The commission said Breannan was "in an excellent position" to view anyone at the window.

Oswald Evicted When Landlady 'Didn't Like Him'

WASHINGTON (AP)—Lee Harvey Oswald lasted only a week in one of his rooming houses because "there was just something about him" that his landlady did not like.

The Warren Commission relates that about six weeks before the Kennedy assassination an elderly woman, Mrs. Mary Bledsoe, rented a room to Oswald but asked him to leave at the end of a week.

"I didn't like his attitude," she testified. "Just didn't want him around me."

Mrs. Bledsoe met Oswald again on Nov. 22, on a bus on which Oswald rode a short distance in Dallas after the assassination.

"Oswald got on," she testified. "He looks like a maniac. His sleeve was out here. . . his shirt was undone.

"Was a hole in it, hole, and he was dirty, and I didn't look at him. I didn't want to know I even seen him . . ."
