

Oswald Brother Agrees With Report's Findings

WICHITA FALLS, Texas (AP)—Robert Oswald agreed Monday with the Warren Commission that said his brother, Lee Harvey Oswald, assassinated President John F. Kennedy.

He added:

"I can't help feeling that somehow, someone originated the idea in Lee's mind, either directly or indirectly."

Oswald, 30, and the father of two, is sales manager for the Acme Brick Co. He moved here in July from Denton. He said he had been well treated in both cities and had not been disturbed.

Oswald said that in recent years he had seen little of Lee, who was slain by Jack Ruby Nov. 24, two days after the assassination last fall.

Asked about views of his mother, Mrs. Marguerite Oswald of Fort Worth who violently disagreed with the Warren report, Oswald said:

"She is free to form her own opinions just as I am."

Oswald gave one of his first interviews since the assassination in Dallas and answered most questions agreeably.

"Up until yesterday I didn't make any public statements re-

garding this in the best interests of the investigation," he said.

Asked "Do you agree with the report?" he answered, "That is correct, I do."

He said the entire investigation was "all very well handled" and that during the time he was in Washington last Feb. 20-22, he was "impressed by the great detail they were going into."
