## A Lie Test On Oswald For Cabbie

New Orleans, March 13 (Special)—Dallas cab driver Raymond W. Gummings, who says he drove Lee Harvey Oswald to Jack Ruby's night club shortly before the as-sassination of President Kennedy, arrived in District Attorney Jim Garrison's office today to take a lie test.

Cummings said Oswald was accompanied by David Ferric, one of the key figures in Garrison's probe of the assassination.

The cab driver was escorted here by his attorney, Frank Wright, who said that Cummings had already given statements in Dallas to investigators from Garrison's office. The nature of the statements was not disclosed, Earlier, attorneys for Clay Shaw, 54, the New Orleans businessman accused of congning to nurder Kennedy, were overruled when they objected to the three-judge panel which will sit at a preliminary hearing tomorrow.

Defense lawyer William Wegmann, at a special hearing today, said the judicial panel of Bermard J. Bagert, Makolm O'llara and Mathew J. Braniss was unconstitutional. He said only one judge should rule tomorrow on whether Shaw must face trial.

The presiding judge, Bagert, sitting with his associates, accepted a prosecution reply that a three-judge panel was legally permissible.

Shaw, distinguished-looking in a well-cut husiness suit, left the courtroom surrounded by about 10 deputy sheriss.

Sheriss Leyde said: "My joh is to escort him safely out of the court to the street. We will not have another Jack Ruby incident in this court house, No erank is going to shoot anyone in this case."
