Cardinal Leans to 'Plot'

Cardinal Cushing disclosed yesterday he "never believed the assassination of President Kennedy was the work of one man." The prelate, one of the closest confidantes of the Kennedy family, also declared, "I don't think the Warren Report is complete.

"There are portions of it that I think should be followed," he said at a press conference at his Brighton residence.

"Much of the evidence never

has been published," the Cardinal added.

His comments on the assassination were in reply to a query about the probe being conducted by New Orleans Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison into a possible conspiracy surrounding the murder.

The frank view placed him among the growing number of persons disputing the Warren Commission's findings that Lee Harvey Oswald alone was responsible for Kennedy's death. The Cardinal admitted he

had no evidence about the assassination and "based everything on rumors and personal belief."

"I never heard of Dist. Atty. Garrison until I read his name in the newspapers.

"As for the Warren Commission, I don't know who was on it." Then he added:

"I don't think the entire Warren Report is available."

"I have nothing else to say except I think if there is anything suspicious it should be investigated."

The Cardinal related his part in the transfer of the bodies of John Kennedy and the two Kennedy infants from the original grave at Arlington Cemetery to the permanent site 20 feet

He was emotionally moved as he told of the experience:

"The whole thing was very private and secret. Two weeks ago they asked me to go with

them -- it was at the invitation of the family.

"I went Tuesday noon to Washington," he said.

The 71-year-old Cardinal said he remained at the grave about seven hours.

"The greatest impression on me was the men who worked the job.

Everything was quiet. They didn't speak. They were shoveling dirt because one of the graves was not large enough and they had to work through the night to enlarge it."

The Cardinal said he went to Sen. Ted Kennedy's house at 10 p. m., and said to himself, "How in the name of God could they do this by 7:30 in the morning?"

While the men were working the Cardinal said: "My heart went out to Bobby Kennedy -- a controversial character, if you wish.

"He stood at the edge of the grave and looked down at the metal container and he relived the assassination of his brother.

"I could see it. I could feel it. I felt like pulling him away. I thought he might fall in."
