## Warren Report Conclusions Growing Public Support

For the first time in over a year, the willingness of the American people to believe that the assassination of President Kennedy was part of a broader plot rather than the work of one man has declined.

A major reason for this shift in public opinion is a sharp drop in the number of people who feel that the investigation by New Orleans Dis-triet Attorney Jim Garrison will shed any new light on the assassination.

Last May and again in this latest Harris Survey a carefully drawn cross section of 1000 families was asked if they had followed the Garrison investigation. In both instances approximately six in ten people had done so. Then each person familiar with Garrison's investigation was asked:
