

PARIS (AP)-Silence and skepticism were the main reactions teday to a French journalist's book reporting that President Charles de Gaulle believes police were involved in the assessmation of President John F. Kennedy and the slaying of Lee Harvey Oswald.

De Gaulle's office refused to comparation the report by Raymond Teurnoux that the French president said of the ansassination: "The police did the job, or elve liney pulled the strings or clse they jet it happen. In any case they were involved."
