

Student Editor Loses Court Appeal

SALEM, Ore.—Annette Buchanan, the former University of Oregon editor who defied a grand jury order to reveal confidential news sources, lost another round in court yesterday.

The Oregon Supreme Court upheld her contempt-of-court conviction, saying it could not rationalize "special constitutional rights for those possessing credentials as news gatherers . . ."

Miss Buchanan, who is now Mrs. Michael Conrad of Portland, had refused to name seven University students who gave her information about marijuana use when she was editor of the student newspaper, the Emerald, in 1966.

The State Supreme Court said the only issue raised was "whether freedom of the press gives a newspaper reporter the constitutional right to preserve the anonymity of an informer in the face of a court order requiring disclosure." It added: "Nothing in the state or Federal constitution compels the courts, in the absence of statute, to recognize such a privilege."

Miss Buchanan said she

would appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Mrs. Oswald Called

NEW ORLEANS—District Attorney Jim Garrison subpoenaed the widow of Lee Harvey Oswald, who assassinated President Kennedy, to appear in Garrison's investigation of the murder.

Marina Oswald Porter said she doubted she could

help in Garrison's investigation but did not indicate whether she would fight the subpoena. The suburban Dallas housewife said, "I don't know if I could prove my innocence to him, Mr. Garrison is so powerful."

Garrison's subpoena said Mrs. Porter "would have knowledge of Lee Harvey Oswald's activities and associates" when the couple lived in New Orleans. Garrison has charged that Oswald, Clay Shaw and David Ferrie conspired with others to assassinate Mr. Kennedy. The trial of Shaw begins Feb. 13.

Addenda

The Justice Department filed a civil antitrust suit in Philadelphia against nine ticket manufactureres who were indicted last June on criminal charges of price fixing, bid-rigging and allocating customers.

About 200 Ohio State University students staged a combination sit-in and debate with four Marine Corps recruiters on the campus, the third and largest protest in three days at the university.
