FBI Denies Conspiracy

Investigation Head Criticizes Committee

DALLAS (UPI) — In the 13 years since the Warren Commission announced its findings, Robert P. Gemberling has headed the FBI investigation into the assassination of President John F. Kennedy.

Gemberling says he is convinced no conspiracy was involved in Kennedy's assassination and he is not happy with a special congressional committee inquiry into the shooting.

"It's costing \$6.5 million bucks a year for this committee (the House Select Committee on Assassinations) to do its work," Gemberling said Monday. "If they don't find anything to prove to the American people there was a conspiracy, are they going to be willing to tell the American people that? Or are they going to want to have another \$6 million?"

"I hope that if they don't find anything, they admit it. But I think they may be embarrassed to admit it. Personally, I think it's a waste of time and money."

Gemberling, a 33-year-veteran of the FBI, plans to retire next month and tour the nation lecturing on a "common sense, nonpolitical analysis" of the assassination.

He said the major point of his lecture series will be the Warren Commission was correct in ruling Lee Harvey Oswald was the lone assassin.

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and there was no conspiracy.
Gemberling said he believes Oswald acted alone because he wanted recognition.

"If anyone would go through the Warren report carefully, they'd find testimony from people about Oswald showing he was schizophrenic. He needed treatment — even his mother

said so.... It could all be capsulized in one word: recognition. He wanted recognition."

Gemberling said classified government documents he has seen support this conclusion.

"I don't know of anything offhand that is classified that would shake the current decision that exists from the Warren Report. But I'm sure there's good reason there are some things that not released to the public. Mostly the reason is national security."
