SUBJECT: ASSASSINATION OF PRESIDENT JOHN FITZGERALD KENNEDY NOVEMBER 22, 1963, DALLAS, TEXAS

New Orleans District Attorney James C. Garrison appeared on a National Broadcasting Company (NBC) television program Saturday evening, July 15, 1967, ostensibly to respond to a one-hour NBC television program which was presented on June 15, 1967, which attacked Garrison's investigation and his methods used in such investigation.

During the course of his one-half hour presentation on television, Garrison produced no new information to that already previously given by him to the press. He alleged that President Rennedy was assassinated by a group of men formerly cuployed by Central Intelligence Agency (CIA). He alleged the shots at President Kennedy care from two different locations from the rear of the motorcade and from one area towards the front of the motorcade on a grassy knoll. These allegations are, of course, completely contradicted by the evidence obtained of the assassination.

Garrison claimed that a "handful" of people in Federal agencies and Washington, D. C., and news agencies in the last are concealing the real truth of the assassination from the American people. Garrison alleged that there are hundreds of documents which are being withheld from public view which would give a real insight into the assassination investigation. He also alleged that heray photographs taken of President kennedy at the time of the autopsy which are. being withheld from public view, would show that President: "Ennedy was hit by bullets from two directions. This allegation is completely false since the k-ray photographs have been examined by highly competent medical authorities who have publicly stated that the X-rays corroborate the 556 official findings of the President's autopsy.

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The "mashington Post" newspaper for Sunday,
July 16, 1967, carried a short article on page A25 summarizing
Garrison's television appearance. The "Washington Post"
newspaper also reported that an NBC spokesman had remarked
after Garrison's television appearance that "Garrison said
nothing" that "alters the information developed by NBC News
about the methods he has used in pressing his theory of the
Kennedy assassination."
