Russo testified at a prelimhe heard Shaw plotting the School issassination with Lee Har-rey Oswald and others at a 5111 Bi rty here in September, 1963. He said Sandra accompanied him to the party. Sandra says he didn't.

THE OTHER motions pertain to Alvin Beaubocuf of Arahi, who claims two Garrison aides tried to bribe and threaten him to testify against Shaw. The defense is seeking a tape recording of the alleged conversation.




