

"VIRGINIA" in the letters referred to above as being in its. VIRGINIA FUZZETTE, a widow who resides at 8294 Maple Street, Apartment 3, New Orleans. He stated that she sate at telephone operator at his company, and that while she appears also to be nuts", she needed the work to support her child and there had been no indication that her job was in jeopardy. He stated that she was somewhat unequested and would not know "left from wight politically." I had claimed to be an FBI anti-communist agent or working for the FBI in any way. He added that he frankly did not believe her capable of being of any value to the FBI along these lines.

The following information concerning Mrs. FUZZETTE was found in the New Orleans file captioned, "ASSASSINATION OF PRESIDENT JOHN F. MENNEDY, NOVEMBER 22, 1963, DALLAS, TEXAS", New Orleans File 89-69. (Bureau File 62-109060)

An individual giving her name as Mrs. VIRGINIA FUZZETTE, 8204 Maple Street, Apartment 3, New Orleans, La., telephonically furnished the following information to SA TROY H. GIST at 9:15 RM, 11/25/63:

she stated that on Wednesday, 11/20/63, at about 11:50 AW, while she was on her way to church, she say a man whom she now thinks may have been LERCEVALD. This man was walking on Camp Street toward the Trade Mart in the direction of Poydras Street. He was alone, and she described him as about 24 years of age, small build, 5'8", sandy-colored, curly hair, and appeared feminine "like many of those you see in the French Quarter, New Orleans." She added he had a tanned complexion, dark eyebrows, was unusual looking, and was dressed in a green plaid shirt, short sleeves, brown trousers, brown shoes, and was not carrying anything, for his hands were in his pockets.

Mrs. FUZZETTE stated she was furnishing this information because she heard on television that OSVAID had been in New Orleans and used to be seen near the Trade Hart. She thought the above incident of possible assistance. She added that she was employed by Captain MEVILLE LEVY.

"I, Mrs., Virginia Barbier Tuzzette, make the following statements to Regis L. Kennedy and Lester G. Davis, who have identified themselves as Special Agents of the Federal Bureau
of Investigation. These statements are given
freely and voluntarily and without threats or promises. I have been advised I do not have to make any statement and that these may be used against me in a court of law. I have also been advised I have the right to consult an attorney.

"I am employed as a switchboard operator at Equitable Equipment Company, New Orleans, IA. I have been employed by this company for about Carlotte of Carlotte of Carlotte

employed by The Federal Bureau of Investigation
in any capacity. I have never considered myself an employee of the F.B.I., although I have on occasion volunteered information to the

F.B.I., which I thought might be of interest to that Agency. I recall that during World War II I notified the F.B.I. that a girl named Marjorie Rose Gutekunst, who was a student at Eleanor McMain High School in New Orleans was wearing a ring with a swastika on it.

"On another occasion, about 1948, I wrote a letter to the F.B.I. advising that h Christina Pobrica, who lives in Buras, Ia., and who sometimes stayed in New Orleans, had mar-

ried a Russian. Ican't recall his name.
"On a recent occasion, I telephoned the F.B.I. and advised that I thought I had seen Lee Oswald, who was suspected of killing President Kennedy, a few days earlier on Camp Street in New Orleans. I later saw the same man again and realized it could not have been Oswald, as he had, himself, been killed. I notified the 7.B.I. of this.

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
