PAUL J. PAROBK

On May 11, 1964, PAUL J. PAROBK, 3471 West 127th Street, Cleveland, Ohio, directed a letter to the Foreman, Federal Grand Jury, United States Courthouse, Chicago, Illinois, requesting that the Grand Jury should look into a conspiracy charge and stated had this action been taken, President JOHN F. KENNEDY would still be alive.

PAROBK was interviewed by Special Agents of the Cleveland Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and explained that the reason he wrote the letter to the Grand Jury in Chicago, was that he did not feel that the Warren Commission was conducting a suitable investigation and their findings would be colored to suit politicians. He also stated that the communists control him and others by a system called "conditional reflex". He said that he is advised of occurrences by a light being turned on in a neighbor's garage, and when the event has occurred, the light is turned out.

PAROBK claimed previous employment with the Lewis Research Center, Cleveland, Ohio, and was discharged as a security risk because he was dangerous to other employees and Government property.

PAROBK admitted receiving treatment as a patient at the Cleveland Psychiatric Institute, Cleveland, Ohio. The records of the Cleveland Psychiatric Institute indicate that PAROBK was admitted on May 8, 1961; went home of his own accord on June 23, 1961; and finally was discharged on August 13, 1962. Condition for which he was treated was not revealed.
