Dear Mr. Hoover:

As you know, the Corrission is nearing the completion of its investigation into the assassination of President Kennedy. In its final Report, the Counission desires to suggest in some appropriate way the extent of the excellent investigative effort undertaken by the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

It would be helpful if the Bureau could supply some statistics which would reflect the scope of the FEI's investigation. In particular, we would appreciate figures on the approximate number of interviews conducted by the Eureau, the pieces of correspondence and reports sent by the Burcau to the Commission, and the total number of pages of such materials. If the information can be obtained without undue difficulty, the Consission would elso like to be adviced concerning the approximate number of Agent-days spent by the Burcau on this investigation since November 22, 1963.

For the Commission's purposes, it is not necessary to distinguish between the investigation conducted regarding Jack L. Ruby and the investigation conducted regarding Las Harvey Cowald and the assassination. I recognize that your work is continuing, but I suggest that a cut-off date of August 1, 1964 would be appropriate for the purpose of compiling these figures. Any thoughts you have about presenting these statistics in the most effective way would be appreciated by the Commission.
