ASSASSINATION OF PRESIDENT  
JOHN FITZGERALD KENNEDY  
NOVEMBER 22, 1963, DALLAS,  
TEXAS

On September 24, 1964, Mr. Edward Stovall, 2801 Colorado Street, Columbus, Georgia, telephonically contacted the Atlanta Office of the FBI, and furnished the following information:

Stovall stated he had information, which this office would be interested in, but would furnish such information only to a Negro Agent of the FBI. He further stated he did not want to be involved in any way, and stated he felt a person (meaning Agent) of his own race would not get him involved.

When inquiry was made as to the nature of his information, he would only say it had to do with the Warren Commission Report on the death of President Kennedy.

On September 29, 1964, October 2, 1964, and October 12, 1964 unsuccessful attempts were made to contact Stovall at his residence, and his wife advised on October 2, 1964, Stovall was working out of the city, and would not return for several days.

On October 15, 1964, Stovall advised that the reason he called the Atlanta Division was to report some information he obtained in 1960. He advised that prior to the presidential election in 1960, he was working as a bricklayer on a private home near Carrollton, Kentucky, and an electrician on the job stated that Kennedy could

not be elected because he was a member of the Masonic Lodge, and that if he were elected he would not live to get out of office. This individual advised he was a member of the Ku Klux Klan, and that the Klan would not accept Kennedy. Stovall advised that he did not think anything of the statement at that time, but since the assassination of the President, the matter has been bothering him.

Stovall stated further he does not recall the individual's name, but he was doing the electrical work on a home being built for an older man who operated a cleaning plant in Carrollton, Kentucky, and the home was approximately one or one and one-half miles South of Carrollton on Route 42, on the South side of the highway. He stated that this was a brick home, and was constructed in 1960.

Stovall described this individual as a white male, 45 - 50 years of age at that time, approximately 6' 1", 190 pounds, and wore glasses. This man lived in the vicinity of Carrollton, but not in the town itself. Stovall stated he received the impression that this person lived in a surrounding town in the general area, and that the owner of the home should be able to supply the identity of the electrician. He recalls no further details, and believes that no one witnessed the conversation.
