The April-June, 1964, issue of "International Review of Criminology and Technical Police", a French publication which is periodically sent to us, contains an article by Jacques Brissaud concerning his theories on the assassination. Brissaud is in no way critical of the Bureau but merely states it is his opinion that Oswald was the "tool" of some unidentified individuals opposed to the Kennedy administration and likewise Ruby was a part of the conspiracy who had the task of eliminating Oswald.

The author endeavors to outline a logical sequence of events relying on published accounts of the assassination. He also endeavors to interject his experience in the law enforcement field in bolstering his theory that a conspiracy must have existed.

Jacques Brissaud is described as the Honorary President of the Court of Appeals and Corresponding Member of the International Society of Criminology at Marmande, France. The article is entitled "In Connection with the Dallas Affair: Did Oswald have any Accomplices?" and appears on page 120 of the aforementioned magazine.

This article contains no information of pertinence to the assassination. Inasmuch as the President's Commission has terminated its inquiries, it is not felt any additional action is necessary with regard to this article.
