Vinson, Jr., dated June 19, 1967, wherein it was reported that a confidential source not connected with the National Broadcasting Company (NBC) has advised the Department that the MBC program of June 19, 1967, would reveal that Clay Bortrand is not identical with Clay Shaw. It was also reported that the Department had confidentially been advised by the same source that Clay Bertrand is one "Gene Davis" of New Orleans. Reference is also made to Mr. Vinson's letter of June 22, 1967, wherein he reported receipt of confidentials information that Gene Davis reportedly operates a bar in 15 New Orleans known as Wanda's, located on the opposite corner from Moran's Rostaurant and next to a garage. ir. Vinson indicated this information was reportedly urnished by Dean Andrews. He requested that this Bureau locate and interview Gene Davis concerning his possible identity as Clay Bertrand. For your information, Gene Davis, owner of Wanda's Bar () in New Orleans, was contacted by Agents of this Bureau on June 23 1967, and advised that he does not know a New Orleans homosexual who used the pseudonym of Clem Bertrand or Clay Bertrand. He was asked if he, himself, ever used the pseudonym of Clem on Clay Bertrand and he replied that he has not. He also claimed that he never, at any time, used an alias, but instead has always used the name of Gene or Eugene Davisans: It's well and the second the name of Gene or Eugene Davis 412:106 Er. Davis further advised that he recalled hearing Talk of om other homosexuals who frequented his bar that a Philipschultz, who was about 50 years of age when he died August 9, 19667had allegedly used the name of either Clay or Clem Bertrand prior to his death. Davis stated that Phil Schultz had a twin

ster by the name of Phyllis Nachman (phonetic) Monique, Wisconsin, Mr. Davis recalled that Phil Schultz was a well-known New Orleans homosexual and was allegedly known to both Dean Andrews and Clay Shaw, key figures in Carrison's assassination probe.

Mr. Davis advised that about two years ago he recalled

receiving a few telephone calls in which the caller asked for a Gene Dayis, an attorney. He added that he has received no other calls since that time and does not know such a person nor has he ever heard of a lawyer by that name.

During our contact with Mr. Davis, he stated he has never been contacted by a representative of NBC in connection with the Garrison probe. He stated he is deathly afraid of Carrison due to the fact that he, himself, is a well-known in the Orleans homosexual. For this reason he desires, under no learn tances, to become involved in the Carrison investigation

for fear of reprisal against him by James C. Carrison. information identifiable with Phil Schultz or Phyllis Nachman (phonetic). In addition, a check of our files disclosed no information indicating Sergeant R. M. Davis, Preston M. Davis or Prentiss Davis, listed in Mr. Vinson's letter of June 19, 1967, use the name Gene Davis or Eugene Davis, or Clem or Clay Bertrand.

Instant denies ever using the pseudonym Clem or Clay Bertrand, or of ever being contacted by a representative of NBC in connection with the Carrison probe, it would be appreciated if you would furnish any additional information your source possesses or may acquire which will assist in clarifying this matter. No additional inquiries in this particular situation are contemplated by this. Bureau at this time in the absence of a specific request from the Department.
