Dear Sir:

I pray fully hope this letter will capture your attention and consideration as it deals with the assassination of your brother, the President.

Before I continue, I wish to explain that I am a patient here and that this hospital is a psychiatric station. However, at this stage of recovery and rehabilitation following a stressful situation and episode, I am in good contact with reality, my memory is back.

The conspirators plot (including the assassination) apparently began about fourteen years ago. I became involved with hopes of gathering data and thwarting any attempts they may make.

Their code word was:

- A - (major arson)
- B - (I have forgotten this one)
- N - (murder of nine nurses)
- E - (assassination of a elected president)
- Y - (youth, something or other)

As the years passed, I broke down mentally but managed to discuss this grave situation with my psychologist,

Dr. [REDACTED] at the V.A. Hospital in Indianapolis. I do not know how many people knew of this or if the FBI had been informed.

I do recall, we discussed how the assassins might psychologically be induced into confessing their crimes. A counter plan was formulated in case the crimes should occur.

The two men who assassinated the President and wounded Gov. Connely were apprehended and placed in custody at the VA Hospital in Indianapolis in November of last year. They were pressured psychologically into confessing.

I do hope you will call this letters to the attention of the F.B.I.

Explain to them that I read the character sketches in February issue of the Reader's Digest in the section "Life In The United States" and recall but two of the sketches.

Also, one issue of the Indianapolis Star published two stories on the front page next to one another. They were: the apprehension of Speck and the probe in New Orleans.

I regret I cannot supply you with more information.


