MISCELLANEOUS - INFORMATION CONCERNING

On November 13, 1967, Mr. Terry Christie, History and Government Professor, Dalton Junior College, Dalton, Georgia, advised that approximately one month ago he submitted a letter to the Attorney General, U. S. Department of Justice. This letter, which was written concerning the Kennedy assassination, was done so at the request of Mrs. Henry McIntosh, Faculty Assistant at Dalton Junior College. Mrs. McIntosh had related the facts set forth in the letter to Mr. Christie. Mr. Christie said he had no direct knowledge of these facts and that Mrs. McIntosh could furnish the entire facts, which he got slightly mixed up in his letter.

On November 13, 1967, Mrs. Helen McIntosh, 10 Rucky Drive, Dalton, Georgia, who is Faculty Assistant at Dalton Junior College, furnished the following information:

TEXAS

In the Spring of 1964, Mrs. McIntosh was a Senior at Hollins College located just outside of Roanoke, Virginia. During the Easter vacation 1964, she went to Dallas, Texas to visit her aunt and uncle, who reside in that city. On the return commercial airline flight to Roanoke, she and a Dr. Kermit Hunter, whom she knew at Hollins, and who was engaged in research concerning outdoor playwrite work at Hollins College, were on the same return flight. Dr. Hunter related the following story to her at this time:

He had come to Dallas during the Easter vacation for a job interview at Southern Methodist University with regard to a professorship in their new Fine Arts College. While in Dallas, he stayed with friends (whose names she did not recall) who lived next door to Jack Ruby. While visiting these friends, a discussion of the assassination took place. These friends told him that the night before the assassination an unshaven, shabbily dressed man came to their door and asked if Jack Ruby lived there. He was advised that Ruby lived next door, at which time he left, apparently going to the Ruby residence. Nothing more was thought of that inquiry at this time. The following day after the assassination, these friends spotted Lee Harvey Oswald's picture on television and in the newspaper, and immediately identified him as being the person who had come to their home the night before the assassination and asked if Jack Ruby lived there.

Mrs. McIntosh stated Dr. Hunter also related this story to other students at Hollins College upon his return.

Mrs. McIntosh thought no more of this story until District Attorney Garrison's investigation concerning the assassination and Oswald's apparent connection with Ruby came out in the newspaper in the Spring of 1967. At this time, Mrs. McIntosh was working at Rich's Inc., Department Store, in Atlanta, Georgia. Around the middle of April, 1967, she placed a long distance

telephone call to District Attorney Garrison's office in New Orleans. She placed the call around 9:00 A.M., Atlanta time, and apparently because of the one hour time difference in New Orleans, she could reach no one at Garrison's office other than a secretary. The secretary advised her that Mr. Garrison was not in the office as yet and would be tied up in court most of the day. She told the secretary she had information concerning the Kennedy assassination which she felt would aid Garrison in his investigation. She was requested to leave her phone number (which she did), and that one of his assistants would contact her later in the day. Late that afternoon when she had not been re-contacted, she again placed a collect call to Mr. Garrison's office. This time she talked to a man who gave her a short Jewish sounding name which she could not recall, but which sounded something like Zager (phonetic). She related the above story to him and terminated the conversation. Approximately two weeks later she was telephonically re-contacted by a man identifying himself as one of District Attorney Garrison's staff and again was asked to relate her story, which she did for the second time.

She thought no more of this incident until Walter Cronkite, news commentator, had his television series during late August or early September, 1967, on the Warren Report. After watching this series, in which the question as to the possibility of Ruby and Oswald being connected came up, but was dismissed, she again became interested. At this time she discussed the story told her by Dr. Hunter with Terry Christie at the Dalton Junior College. Mr. Christie told her the proper people to notify would be the Attorney General's Office at the Justice Department. At her request, he wrote the letter to the Department of Justice for her relating the above facts, which he had slightly wrong in the letter.

In conclusion, Mrs. McIntosh stated that Dr. Hunter is now Head of the Fine Arts Center at the Southern Methodist University in Dallas, Texas.
