In California, Bradley said he believes the charge against him is a case of mistaken identity because he was questioned by FBI agents about three years ago and was told they were seeking another "Gene Bradley" whose description did not fit his.

The warrant for his arrest said bond has been set at \$10,000. This will stand unless Judge Matthew S. Braniss, the criminal court judge who will hear the case, orders it lowered.
