Referenced teletype contains information concerning Davis, California.

Bureau files contain the following information concerning one also known as who may be identical with the individual named in referenced communication. On September 11, 1957, whose address was Bronx, New York, contacted an Agent at Cheyenne, Wyoming. He advised he had been working with Vice-President Humphrey on the Maffia and said he was to inform the Vice-President of his whereabouts through the FBI. He advised he had left New York City en route to San Francisco, California, where he would contact the local PBI Office. According to he could not call or send a telegram to the Vice-President because his instructions were to work through the FBI. He declined to furnish further information but informed that he would be leaving Cheyenne on the same date via Greyhound Bus.

On January 15, 1957, appeared at the New York Office and desired to speak with the Assistant Director in charge or the Director, FBI. He was reluctant

to discuss the nature of his visit but did advise he was seeking assistance in bringing his mother to the United States from Helsinki, Finland, where the local police were attempting to kill her. He claimed he could not return to Finland because the police allegedly tried to kill him when he traveled from Oslo, Norway, to Copenhagen, Denmark, and he believed the police would attempt to do the same if he returned to his home in Finland.

States on 11/15/55 on a "Businessman's Visa" which had expired on 12/10/65. He claimed he had reported to INS at New York and had turned his passport over to that agency. New York reported that during the interview appeared highly nervous and agitated and one one occasion broke down and cried. Subsequent to his appearance at the New York Office he called on another occasion and asked if there were any messages for him. He claimed he was employed as a textile engineer in Brooklyn. Mhen questioned, he was unable to explain the would-be nature of the messages he expected. On 8/26/67 telephonically contacted the New York Office and spoke incoherently about an exchange group which was allegedly going overseas. He said he had called the Office of Vice-President Humphrey in Washington, D: C., who referred him to the FBI.

Information concerning was furnished to U. S. Secret Service in New York on 9/12/67 and to U. S. Secret Service in Denver, Colorado, on 9/11/67. In view of the present location of Sacramento is instructed to notify U. S. Secret Service.

No interview of is to be conducted.

Sacramento advised on 1/3/58 that the editor of the Sacramento Union, a daily newspaper, advised that came to his office and wished to relay a message to the New York Times to the effect "that he was in trouble again because he knew too much concerning the assassination of President Kennedy." He identified himself as The editor contacted the San Francisco, New York Times representative and advised him regarding Sarenti who advised that he did not know anything about the matter. Sacramento requested check of Bureau files and Dallas files for information regarding and whether he should be interviewed. In view of information in this communication, Sacramento should notify W. S. Secret Service regarding location and no interview should be conducted.
