

On the basis of the above promise traveled to New Orleans, Louisiana, with one Thomas William Sanders. Stated that they traveled in Sanders' automobile from San Francisco to New Orleans. described Sanders as a political writer in San Francisco. Sanders' purpose in making the trip with was to interview James Garrison.

to Garrison and his assistant, one Mr. Alcock. Alcock stated he would arrange to pay roundtrip expenses. Alcock advise that he believed tory was a "CIA plant" in case anything happens to Garrison.

to date and that on January 5, 1968, Sanders abruptly departed New Orleans, taking all of personal papers and their cat.
