

Garrison's Office had subpoessed Dr. Stanley L. Breanin of Los Angeles, Californiz, and Clinton Whent'of Burney, California, to testify before a Grand Jury in New Orleans on Kay 29 and 30, 1963, regarding Garrison's probe of the assassination of former President John Fitzgerald Kennedy. According to the news story, Garrison's Office alleged that Dr. Drennan was present in 1963 at a discussion concerning the assassination of President Kennedy and Wheat participated in 1963 in discussions at his home concerning the assessination. Dr. Drennan may be identical with the individual of the game name. Apart from the reasons given in the newspaper article, we have no information as to exactly why Garrison has subpoenaed Drennan and Wheat. No information exists in our files which ties either of these men to Lee Harvey Oswald or to Clay Shaw. Garrison has issued a subpoena for Eugene Bradley, the Californian from Los Angeles, and Garrison may be trying to tie these two men, to Bradley. Our files do not contain the results of the United States Secret Service check on Drennan's whereabouts on November 22, 1963, other than the establishment of the fact by United States Secret Service that Drennan was in Los Angeles on That date.-
