Oswald's Widow Files New Claim

The widow of Lee Harvey Oswald wants a Dallas federal judge to reverse his former ruling and order the government to pay her \$95,000 for Oswald's personal property.

Mrs. Marina Oswald Porter originally sought \$500,000 for about 500 items seized from Oswald's apartment after President John F. Kennedy's assassination.

This week Mrs. Porter's attorney, Erich F. Klein, Jr., asked the court to reverse an earlier decision and award Mrs. Porter "just compensation" for the property before it was damaged.

The property was "substantially destroyed and greatly decreased in value while it was in the exclusive care and control" of the government, she contends.

Mrs. Porter asks that she be paid fair market value as of the date it was seized, Nov. 22, 1963. The government contends she should receive the fair market value for the property on the date it took title to the property — Nov. 1, 1966.
