## GARRISON CASE FIGURES SUED

### \$1.5 Million in Damages Asked by Bradley

LOS ANGELES — A California man, whom Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison attempted to prosecute on charges of conspiring to assassinate President John F. Kennedy, Wednesday filed a \$1.5 million damage suit against six defendants who he said tried to link him with the killing.

Edgar Eugene Bradley avoided prosecution in the case when California refused to extradite him to Louisiana as requested by Garrison.

His suit names author Mark Lane, the Westinghouse Broadcast Co. of San Francisco, the Assassination Inquiry Committee, the Los Angeles Free Press, the New York Free Press, and Carol Aydelotte as defendants.

In the suit Bradley, a 52-year-old business representative for a radio evangelist, alleged that news stories about the extradition request ruined his chances of becoming a Republican candidate for Congress.

Bradley, who was indicted by Orleans Parish grand jury, denied the charges. Garrison eventually dropped his efforts to extradite Bradley and cited the death of an unnamed "major witness as the reason."

The only other man indicted on conspiracy charges in Garrison's probe, Clay Shaw, was acquitted after trial by jury.
