## Shooting Gory Sight

## Kennedy's Head Thrown Backward, Film Shows

Many television viewers here saw for the first time Friday morning the gory sight of President John F. Kenendy's head thrown backward as he was plasted with an assassin's bullet in Dallas II years ago.

The film, shown for the first time stionally by the American Broadcasting Co., was billed by its narrators as proof that at least one shot hit the president from the tront.

Compacted onto a television screen, the 8 millimeter film lost much of the letail that was visible when one of its carrators, Robert Groden of New York, showed it on a movie screen in Dallas earlier this week.

The 90-second film was shown loonly by WFAA-TV on its Wide World of Entertainment show after 468 peoole protested by telephone in one day when station president Mike Shapiro it first decided not to air it.

An ecumenical group of Dallas tergymen made an unsuccessful atmpt Thursday to stop the station rem showing the movie. The Dallas Pastors Association approved a statement of concern by a vote of 2 to 3 stating that showing the film serves no constructive purpose for the country or the citizens of Dallas."

Shapiro, in a disclaimer read beire the show began at midnight, said
lewers "are not going to see, by
soking at the film, any new version
of the assassination. It just doesn't
vist in the television version on ABC.

What you are going to see is going to
Shocking.

Geralds Rivera, host for Wide World of Entertainment, told his audience before the film was shown after 1 a.m. that "If you are at all queasy, then don't watch this film. Just turn on the late night movie because this is very heavy."

Groden said as the film showed Kennedy being hit by gunfire and part of the right front of his skull was blown off that "the violent backward motion is totally consistent with 80 per cent of the witnesses who said the shot came from the grassy knoll in front and to the right."

The Warren Commission concluded in 1964 that Kennedy was shot by a lone gunman, Lee Harvey Oswald, from the sixth floor of the Texas Book Depository building to the rear of the president's car.

Notably cut from Groden's version of the film originally made by Dallas dressmaker Abraham Zapruder is a scene which Groden asserts shows a second gunman behind the west retaining wall of the white colonnade on the grassy knell.

In the commentary that fellowed the film, historian and writer Ralph Schoenman stated that Oswald was an agent of the Central Intelligence Agency.

Schoenman said a Secret Service report, "which the Warren Report chooses not to discuss," refers to Allan Sweatt, chief criminal deputy sheriff in Dallas County, "who discusses the FBI number of Lee Harvey Oswald, \$172."

"And the document makes reference to a CIA number for Oswald, No. 11069." Schoenman said.

The historian-writer also said testimony of Jack Ruby, Dallas nightclub operator who killed Oswald two days

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after the assassination, "states that he can't tell the truth in Dallas. He wants to be taken to Washington.

"He says 'you will never see me alive if you don't get me out of Dallas.'"

Schoenman said Ruhy told this to then Chief Justice Earl Warren, then U.S. Rep. Gerald Ford and Houston attorney Leon Jaworski, among others. Ford, now president, was a member of Warren's Commission investigating the assassination and Jaworski, later special Watergate prosecutor, was representing then Texas Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr in 1964.

Rivera ended the show by stating "there are just too many loose ends."

Shapiro showed the film despite a warning from Time Inc., owner of the copyrights to the film movie, that it had "not authorized the showing of the film." Time asked him not to run the film.

Shapiro said Arlen Specter, an assistant counsel to the Warren Commission, will appear on Wide World of Entertainment later this month to present his case for the commission's findings that a lone assassin killed Kennedy.
