 WASHINGTON (UPI) -- SEN. RICHARD SCHWEIKER, R-Pa., said today he is asking the Senate to reinvestigate the 1963 assassination of President John Kennedy because Lee Harvey Oswald and Jack Ruby may have had CIA and FBI connections.  
 His evidence, Schweiker told reporters, shows possible connections between the Central Intelligence Agency and the FBI with Oswald, who was accused of shooting Kennedy with a rifle in Dallas, and Ruby, the nightclub owner, who killed Oswald.  
 Schweiker, a member of the 11-man Senate Select Committee on Intelligence, asked if a resolution to be presented to the Senate that national archive documents on the assassination, ordered sealed for 75 years, be opened; that funds be allocated for a new investigation; that if necessary the panel's mandate be extended beyond Jan. 31, 1976, until the assassination is further clarified.  
 Schweiker said the investigation should focus initially on the role of U.S. intelligence agencies in investigating the assassination of the "warrior" commission, which reported there was no conspiracy. Oswald shot Kennedy Nov. 22, 1963, and then Ruby killed Oswald in his own volition.  
 Schweiker said Ruby was an FBI informant, according to a letter Hoover himself wrote.  
 "Secret disclosures have devaluated the credibility of the Warren Commission report," Schweiker said.  
 "I do not have evidence the commission's primary investigative approach -- the Federal Bureau of Investigation -- best evidence suppressed evidence," Schweiker said. "And there are indications the FBI may have influenced witnesses to believably mislead the Warren Commission."  
 Schweiker held up a copy of a letter from the Warren Commission, dated July 1964, in which he said that the FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover might have told the Warren Commission about FBI links with Lee Harvey Oswald, when it asked by the President to answer truthfully.  
 Schweiker also cited the report which led to the FBI Director Lawrence Kelley that Oswald visited the Dallas office of the FBI several days before the assassination and turned over a letter threatening to blow up the FBI office on the Dallas police. They persisted in up-ticking his Russian-Lorraine...
