Dear Senator Griffin,

Recent coverage by the news media indicated that an interest is surfacing in the reopening of the investigation of the assassination of President John F. Kennedy by the Senate. I have become familiar with many facets of the case, both pro and con. However, I am not qualified to make any judgements for either side of the controversy since the only type of reading material I can obtain reveals a subjective view of the situation; rarely do I find one that is objective in its views. I believe that an objective investigation is necessary both for the American people to gain renewed faith in their government, to fully comprehend what our governmental agencies are capable of doing, and to finally bring the judicial process back into the hands of the people.

My own personal interest, however, for trying to become involved does not contain any philosophical basis. I merely do not like to start things and then give up without some sort of an answer. The assassination became just another one of my intense readings and now there are just too many unsolved questions which I must have answered before I close my book and go on to another.

The purpose of this letter, therefore, is to request some information as to how I may become actively involved in aiding in the reopening of the case. I realize that the matter is a sensitive topic to many important people and that the reopening may not be obtained, or will be detained for a long time due to the upcoming 1976 election. Let's just say that I don't want to wait that long before I go onto my next book.
