On 7/20/76, [redacted] who resides at [redacted] Upper Arlington, Ohio, and who is occupied [redacted] University Hospital, Columbus, Ohio, furnished the following information to SA [redacted] Columbus, Ohio RA:

In June, 1963, she moved into an apartment located on Wisconsin Avenue, Washington, D. C. The apartment building in which she resided was approximately two blocks below National Cathedral. She resided with [redacted] about 32 years of age, whose home was Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

She was married at the time, and her maiden name was [redacted]. However, she also used the name [redacted]. She was employed by the American Security and Trust Bank, located across from the White House in Washington D. C. She was a secretary to [redacted].

Her roommate, [redacted] was employed at the Navy Department Annex, Washington, D. C. [redacted] was dating a male named [redacted] (phonetic), whom she subsequently married. [redacted] now is believed to be residing in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania with her husband, but her address is not known.

In mid-August or early September, 1963, she and her roommate, [REDACTED] received a series of telephone calls on the telephone in their apartment. She did not recall the telephone number of the telephone in her apartment. The series of telephone calls always commenced after 11:00 PM, and occurred an average of 3-4 times each week.

The unknown caller possessed a mature male voice, and it was always the same person who called. During the initial call, that unknown male had asked for "PEGGY," and thereafter insisted that she [REDACTED] was "PEGGY." She always denied that claim by the unknown male, to no avail.

The unknown male made statements such as "If it wasn't for you, I wouldn't have lost all that money," and would threaten to come up and kill "PEGGY." The male sometimes called "PEGGY" a whore and referred to "PEGGY's" mother also as a whore. During their conversations, the unknown male revealed "PEGGY" lived on M Street or P Street, Washington, D. C., between Wisconsin Avenue and DuPont Circle. The male had mentioned an address, which [REDACTED] no longer recalled. The male also had mentioned that "PEGGY" worked for one of the Senate committees, either that of Senator FULLBRIGHT or Senator MC CLELLAND.

The unknown male gave the impression he had lost money on a "land deal" which had not materialized, and "PEGGY" had set him up for the loss. The male definitely was angry with "PEGGY."

The telephone calls from the male were not made from any pay telephone, because she never heard any money deposited. The telephone calls were placed by an operator, apparently a long distance telephone operator. Once the telephone operator said the telephone call was originating in New Orleans. The telephone calls placed by the male never were person-to-person calls. The telephone calls varied in duration, depending whether she or [REDACTED] felt like carrying on a conversation. She and [REDACTED] talked to the unknown male just for the novelty of the conversation.

[REDACTED] said she assumed that "PEGGY" formerly had the phone number then assigned to herself and [REDACTED]

However, after the unknown male made a threat to come "up there" and kill "PEGGY," she decided she had best try to locate "PEGGY" and warn her. Inasmuch as she had "PEGGY's" address, she discovered "PEGGY's" telephone was unlisted. She mentioned the telephone calls and the threat from the unknown male to her boss, [REDACTED], and he suggested she call the telephone company and notify the authorities. She reported the telephone calls to the telephone company and the "Georgetown Police." She notified the "Georgetown Police" by telephone.

She contacted "PEGGY" by calling the office of the Senate committee (either Senator FULLBRIGHT or Senator MC CLEBLAND) and told "PEGGY" her name. She informed "PEGGY" regarding the telephone calls and threats. "PEGGY" had inquired whether the telephone calls had been obscene or threatening. "PEGGY" had said she knew who the telephone calls were from, but had mentioned no name. "PEGGY" said she did not want to talk to the unknown male and did not want to give [REDACTED] her telephone number. She had no further contacts with "PEGGY," and did not recall "PEGGY's" last name. She said the name could have been "PEGGY CONNELLY," but she did not know whether she now confused "PEGGY's" name with the name of [REDACTED] boy friend.

The last time the unknown male contacted her [REDACTED] by telephone, she heard a "lot" of background noise, as though the caller was in a bar. The unknown male had said "He and I are going to come up there and kill the whole God-damned bunch of you - KENNEDY and JOHNSON." During that conversation, there was some sort of commotion on the telephone, and she overheard the male say "For God's sake, HARRY, put that gun down. It's not time - you've got plenty of time."

During the winter of 1966 or 1967, when the events centering around JIM GARRISON in New Orleans being highlighted by the media, she had seen and heard a taped interview of CLAY SHAW. At that time, she had thought that CLAY SHAW might have been the unknown male who had called her apartment seeking "PEGGY," and the name "HARRY" might have been "HARVEY." In other words, the unknown male might have been referring to LEE HARVEY OSWALD, and there might have been some sort of conspiracy between the unknown male caller and OSWALD. However, she had absolutely no proof regarding her suspicions.

[REDACTED] said she had not made any possible connection between the telephone calls from the unknown male and the assassination of President JOHN F. KENNEDY at the time of the KENNEDY assassination, and she did not know whether there was any connection whatever. However, after seeing and hearing CLAY SHAW, the suspicion had occurred to her. She had told her husband about her suspicions (she had married in the meantime) and he had not encouraged her to reveal the suspicions. Therefore, she had said nothing until the present. She had recalled her suspicions due to the recent publicity concerning the possibility of OSWALD's connection with some conspiracy to assassinate President KENNEDY.

[REDACTED] said she did not have any records which she felt would disclose her address at the time of the telephone calls from the unknown male in Washington, D. C., or her telephone number at the time. She said it was possible her employer, American Security and Trust Bank, might have some personnel records with that information.

[REDACTED] concluded by stating that she and [REDACTED] moved out of their apartment in Washington, D. C. in November, 1963.
