Records Reveal In Missouri in '67

The Federal Bureau of Investigation today disclosed the true name of the suspected assassin of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., identifying him as James Earl Ray, a 40-year-old to Hoover, that Ray has served escapee from the Missouri State terms in the Los Angeles Coun-Penitentiary.

The identification was accomplished by experts working around the clock in the files of the FBI's Identification Division

The records reveal that Ray who escaped from the Missouri Penitentiary at Jefferson City April 23, 1967, was sent to that prison March 17, 1960 on a 20year sentence following conviction in St. Louis for armed robbery. The FBI released a photo-

During his career, Hoover said Ray also had used the names of Harvey Lowyer and John Willard, both also linked to the King slaying, and also the aliases James McBride, James Walton, W. C. Herron and James O'Conner.

He began using the name of Galt after his escape from the Missouri jail and it was under this name that he bought the white Mustang car the FBI has

In the week before King's slaying, the FBI said Ray also used the name of Harvey Lowmyer to purchase in Birmingham, Ala., the 30.06-caliber Remington Gamemaster rifle the FBI believes was used to fire the fatal shot and registered as John Willard in the Memphis flophouse from which the shot was fired.

The FBI said Ray claims to have been born March 10, 1928 in Illinois, but the location is not known, nor have any records of the birth been located.

Ray is approximately 5 feet 10 inches tall and weighs about 163 to 174 pounds. The FBI said he has blue eyes and brown hair and has a small scar on the center of his forehead and a scar on the palm of his right hand. Both 1960 and 1953 photos of the suspect show that his left ear protrudes further than normal from his head.

Ray has claimed that he attended school through the 10th grade in Alton, Ill. The FBI said he has the reputation of being a "drifter" since leaving school and has worked, among other things, as a baker and laborer.

It was not immediately ilete mined whether the Justice Department would lodge a new civil rights conspiracy charge against Ray, like that issued Wednesday in the name of Galt.
