A Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation told Police Lieutenant JACK REVEL approximately one hour after the arrest of OSWALD that the prime suspect in the shooting was sympathetic to the Communist Party. He also told the officer at 2:50 P.M., November 22/ that the PBI was aware of OSWALD's presence in Dallas and that he had been checked. OSWALD once defected to Russia but returned to the United States.

Lieutenant addressed the report to Chief J. E. CURRY.

The lieutenant, who heads the Criminal Intelligence Section

of the Special Service Bureau, dictated the report as routine matter on the afternoon of November 22.

Early Saturday morning, November 23, 1963. Chief CURRY revealed that the FBI had been aware of OSWALD's presence Dallas police. The FBI had not previously notified.

A spokesman for the PBI had not previously notified.

A spokesman for the PBI said that normal security is a circumstances requiring joint action. In the case of OSWALD, PBI checks did not indicate that he was a man of violence.
