Synopsis: On 1/9/64, U.S. District Judge ABRAHAM L. MAROVITZ ordered psychiatric examination of subject WILSON to be conducted by WILLIAM H. HAINES, M.D., Director of Behavior Clinic, Criminal Court of Circuit Court of Cook County. HAINES found subject able to understand nature of proceedings and capable of assisting in his own defense. On 1/16/64, Judge MAROVITZ directed Assistant U.S. Attorney JAMES B. SLOAN, Chicago, to prepare order reflecting psychiatric evaluation that subject was competent to stand trial. On 1/17/64, after reading psychiatric report in full, Judge MAROVITZ directed that subject be furnished complete psychiatric examination at Medical Center for Federal Prisoners, Springfield, Missouri. Psychiatric examination at Medical Center for Federal Prisoners, Springfield, Missouri, reflects subject able to understand charges against him and to assist counsel in his defense.

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DETAILS: AT CHICAGO, ILLINOIS

On January 17, 1964, SA JOSEPH NOONAN, Secret Service, Chicago, Illinois, advised as follows:

On January 3, 1964, LLOYD JOHN WILSON appeared before Judge HARRY CAMERFORD, Branch 42A, Municipal Court, Chicago, Illinois. Judge CAMERFORD dismissed the local charge of disorderly conduct against WILSON in favor of the federal charge of threatening President LYNDON B. JOHNSON. On this same date, WILSON was taken before United States Commissioner C. S. BENTLEY PIKE, Chicago, at which time his attorney, RAYMOND SMITH, requested a hearing. WILSON was held in custody in lieu of \$25,000 bond, and the date for his hearing was set as January 10, 1964.

On January 9, 1964, Assistant United States Attorney JAMES B. SLOAN, Chicago, appeared before United States District Court Judge ABRAHAM L. MAROVITZ to request a sanity hearing for WILSON. Judge MAROVITZ directed that WILSON be given a psychiatric examination by WILLIAM E. HAINES, M.D., Director of Behavior Clinic for the Criminal Court of the Circuit Court of Cook County. Judge MAROVITZ set January 16, 1964 as the date when this psychiatric examination report would be submitted.

On January 16, 1964, Judge MAROVITZ received the report of Dr. HAINES. Dr. HAINES, in his report, set forth that he did not have the benefit of any prior psychiatric examinations of WILSON and was unacquainted with the background of this subject. Dr. HAINES further made clear that his examination of WILSON was confined specifically to two questions: 1) Is WILSON able to understand the nature of the legal proceedings and the charge placed against him? and 2) Could WILSON properly assist in his own defense and cooperate with his counsel? Dr. HAINES' report reflects

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that his examination indicated to him that WILSON is capable of: 1) Understanding the nature of the proceedings, and 2) To properly assist in his own defense and cooperate with his counsel.

Based on this report, Judge MAROVITZ directed Assistant United States Attorney SLOAN to prepare an order reflecting the results of the above examination.

On January 17, 1964, before Assistant United States Attorney SLOAN had completed the drafting of the order mentioned above, Judge MAROVITZ took the opportunity to read in its entirety the psychiatric report on WILSON, both from Dr. HAINES and also reports of [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] Court of Chicago and a [REDACTED] an associate of [REDACTED]. According to Assistant United States Attorney SLOAN, these reports contain [REDACTED] opinion that WILSON's mental status is [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] This report was dated December 20, 1963 and was a result of a psychiatric examination ordered by the Municipal Court of Chicago following the subject's arrest on December 19, 1963. Attached to the same report was a supplemental wherein [REDACTED] an associate of [REDACTED] reflected that following his examination of WILSON on December 21, 1963, he diagnosed WILSON as [REDACTED]

On this same date, Judge MAROVITZ ordered that WILSON be transported forthwith to the Medical Center for Federal Prisoners, Springfield, Missouri, at which location he was to undergo a psychiatric examination to determine his ability to stand trial. Judge MAROVITZ indicated at the time of this order that Dr. HAINES' report had made it clear that Dr. HAINES had no background information on WILSON at the time of his examination, and he therefore felt that

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Dr. HAINES' examination did not sufficiently settle the subject's mental condition in order that the Court could make a judicial decision as to WILSON's sanity.

On April 8, 1964, Assistant United States Attorney JAMES B. SLOAN advised SA DENNIS W. SHANAHAN that he had received no information to date concerning the subject's mental examination at Springfield, Missouri. He advised that no further legal developments would occur until such time as the psychiatric examination was completed.

AT SPRINGFIELD, MISSOURI

On January 31, 1964, MELVIN LEMONS, Secretary to the Warden, Medical Center for Federal Prisoners, advised SA JAMES A. MITCHELL that WILSON had been received at this institution on January 25, 1964. Mr. LEMONS advised that it is normally 90 days before any determination of mental competency is made. WILSON's classification date was scheduled for March 25, 1964. Mr. LEMONS noted that the Honorable Judge A. L. MAROVITZ, Northern District of Illinois, Chicago, Illinois, had requested that WILSON's psychiatric examination be completed within 15 days or such reasonable time thereafter in order to give the subject a thorough mental examination.

On January 27, 1964, the Medical Center directed a letter to Judge MAROVITZ in which they requested a 90 day extension in order to complete their examination of WILSON.

Date 4/2/64

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Mr. BILL TAPPANA, Record Clerk, Medical Center for Federal Prisoners, Springfield, Missouri, made available their file number 0-677-H, pertaining to LLOYD JOHN WILSON. WILSON is described as:

Race	White
Sex	Male
Age	18

He was committed to the Medical Center under Section 4244 of Title 18, U. S. Code, and received at the prison on January 25, 1964. He is charged with making a threat to kill the President of the United States, LYNDON B. JOHNSON, in violation of Section 871, Title 18, U. S. Code.

Since January 31, 1964, WILSON has been working in the laundry and has been housed in A-1 which is a close-confinement unit.
