In respect to this Item, Inspector ZARZA stated that with the exception of the signatures and the date of application, the possibility was that most or all of the handwriting was in the hand of the postal clerk handling the application.

ZARZA made inquiry and it was determined that the postal clerk with initials "R.T." was substitute clerk The second s INSEKED. -SEARCHED.

ZARZA stated that it was not possible to search. Post Office boxes by reference to name of the person renting the bo that information concerning the boxes could only be located through reference to the box number.

CAMPBELL, USPO, 701 Loyola Avenue, New Orleans, Louisiana, advised that Postal Inspector ZARZA was on a special assignment for his agency in Chicago, Illinois. On June 22, 1964, WILLIAM MULLIN, Assistant Superintendent, Lafayette Square Station. USPO, 610 South Street, New Orleans, Louisiana, advised that he believed postal employee ABRAHAM PLOUGH was the individual who originally located Post Office Form 1093, following the assassination of President JOHN F. KENNEDY and thereafter gave this form to Postal Inspector JOSEPH ZARZA.

On June 23, 1964, ABRAHAM PLOUGH, Foreman of the Mails, Lafayette Square Station, USPO, was contacted at his residence

Mr. PLOUGH stated that he recalled that at approximately 8:00 p.m., on November 22, 1963, he received a telephone call at his residence from Postal Inspector JOSEPH ZARZA, instructing PLOUGH to come to the Lafayette Square Station in order to open the premises. Mr. PLOUGH stated he went to Lafayette Square Station where he met Mr. ZARZA who subsequently informed him that ZARZA desired the Post Office Department Application Form for Post Office box 30061. Mr. PLOUGH stated he then went to a file containing the applications for Post Office boxes and obtained the application card for box 30061, which he gave to Inspector ZARZA. Mr. PLOUGH stated that up until this time he did not know the reason for Inspector ZARZA's desiring this card, however, when he gave the application card to Inspector ZARZA, ZARZA informed him that LEE HARVEY OSWALD had rented Post Office box 30061 and was believed to be the party who shot President KENNEDY.

A photograph of Item nc. 17, listed on page 2 of a letter dated May 20, 1964, from the President's Commission to Mr. JOHN EDGAR HOOVER, Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, was exhibited to Mr. PLOUGH. Mr. PLOUGH said that Post Office Department Form 1093 depicted in this photograph bearing the signature "L. H. OSWALD" is the form he gave to Inspector JOSEPH ZARZA.
