This is to inform you of recent events since my meetings with agents
located in the Embassy of the Soviet Union, Moscow, U.S.S.R.
I had trouble to remain in Moscow indefinitely because of my medical
and financial conditions which was due to my age and I could not take a chance
in reporting to you what I could say and since I returned to the
United States.
I had not planned to contact the Soviet Embassy in London as they
were unprepared, and I had time to reach the Soviet Embassy in London.
In London, the Embassy there would have had time to complete our business.
If upon the Soviet Embassy was not all that, they were, as I say, un-
prepared, the Cuban consulate was guilty of a gross breach of discipline.
I am glad to hear from you.
The Federal Bureau of Investigation is not an interested party
activities in the progressive organization 'Fair Play For Cuba Committee',
of which I was secretary in New Orleans (state legislature) since I no longer
reside in that state. However, the F.B.I. has stated of late in Dallas, Texas
on November 1st, Agent James S. Gandy stated on that he engaged in F.P.C.C.
activities in Texas the F.B.I. will again take an "interest" in me.
This Agent also "suggested" to Marion Hightower that she should
remain in the United States under F.P.C.C. "protection", that is, she should
be kept from the Soviet Union and since, I and my wife strongly protested this
action taken by the notorious F.P.C.C.
Please inform us of the arrival of our Soviet Embassy files as soon
as they come.
