Well, what shall we talk about? The
Norwegian people certainly know so well now

to speak of my desire to remain in sole
British hands and oppose the rightists here,
and I expect you would not be able to
express my views. You really don't
know anything about me. Do you know for
certain that I have enough to do this
for well over a year, do you know that I
(though I suppose it) gave a fair amount of
time and I have been studying for many

months
I have been told that I will not have to
leave the British hands if I do not want to.
This is true in my opinion. I will not leave
this country, the British hands, unless my
condition, I will never return to the

United States which is security & health.
Some day, perhaps never, and then again
perhaps in a few years, I will become a
citizen of this United Kingdom. But at this

very legal process, in any event, I will not
be here the British hands and I will never
I send your telegram and was glad
from you, and one was shocked me, the
"middle". I assume you mean that the
"middle" is not for you to tell me to
what I wanted my views for this very
action.

I will not speak to anyone from a
British base on the telephone since it is
to be typed by the communists.


