Found in Houston Area Wife's Home

DALLAS (AP) — Dallas Police Chief J. Lee Carr said today that a photograph found in the home of Lee Harvey Oswald's Houston-area wife had been taken with the rifle used in the assassination of President Kennedy.

Carr said the picture found in the home is "definitely Irving" Oswald's. He said the picture was taken in the home of Oswald's mother, Mrs. Oswald. He has been charged with murdering the President, killing a Dallas policeman and taking the ship to the Warren Commission. The last charge, which was dropped, was for the murder of Mrs. Oswald. "We had the gun in our hands when we were in the house," Carr said.
