OSWALD, 7813 Davemport furest, advised his brother, Eld Halvey OSWALD, and family had moved to an apartment on Ecreedes Street, house number unknown to ROBERT; however, he volunteered this particular street is only about two blocks in length, and his brother could easily be located. Mill. OSWALD also advised his brother, LEE, had recently gone to work as a machinist for a company located in White Settlement Village, but MR. OSWALD stated he did not have the name or address of this concern.

Inquiries conducted in the vicinity of the 2700 block of Lorcedos Street on August 15, 1962, revealed LEE BARVEY OSWALD was residing at 2703 Hercedos Street, Fort Forth.

LET MARVEY COULLD, reinterviewed near his remidence, 2703 Hereofes Street, Fort Worth, Comes, stated he has resided at this address since about the middle of July, 1962 with his wife, Mindle, and daughter, June End Commun. The stated he has been employed as machinist for Mindle's Michine Endy, 200-E North Vacch (Thite Settlement Village), Fort Borth, since about July 15, 1962.

COMMID stated contact had been made by letter with the Servict Embassy in Eashington, D.C., to advice the Embassy of his wife's current address, saying this is something that is required by Servict Law. He stated she would continue to make reports periodically to the Servict Embassy in instances where they moved to another address.

CSTAID advised the matter of his having been given an undersimable discharge on August 17, 1989, from the U.S. Marine Corps Reserve by reason of unfitness has not been reviewed, and, he did not know when the matter would be heard.

CSUALD volunteered to had never enjoyed his service in the U.S. Harine Corps. He also stated he had not enjoyed his trip to the Seviet Union any more than he had enjoyed his service in the U.S. Harine Corps.

OSMALD stated positively no individual had made any contact with him since his arrival in Fort Worth in the interest of the Soviet Union.

CSUALD denied he had on October SI, 1959, or any other time, requested his U.S. citizenship be revoked. He denied he ever teck any stops to apply for Soviet citizenship. He advised he never at any time affirmed allegiance to the Soviet Union, or indicated a villingness to do so.

CSMLD advised whon he first arrived in the Soviet Union, and also when he started to leave, he was interviewed by representatives of the UVD, which he characterized as being the secret police, who, for the most part handle criminal matters among the population generally. He stated their operation is wide—spread. He denied he ever made any "deals" with the UVD, and stated he was never asked to undertake anything or do anything for them.

OSUALD donied to ever told the Soviets at any time he would make available to them information concerning his U.S. Marine Corps speciality.

COUMLD advised in about May 19, 1961, he becaus fearful some reprisals might be taken against him for knying made the trip to the Coviet Union. In stated he then inquired of the American Embassy in Moscov, Russia, as to the possible legal complications. No stated the Embassy assured him tley were aware of me evidence which would warrant presecution against him, should be return to the United States. In this connection, COUMLED stated the American Debassy tried to persuade him to return to the United States alone, and without his wife, MARHM. He told the imbassy he could not do that.

The Embassy repertedly pointed out to CSMALD it would be a difficult matter to obtain a passport for CSMALD's wife, who was a Empain. The Embassy twied to influence him to come back alone, find a job, get established, and later send for his wife. CSMALD stated he refused to follow this course. He told the American Embassy he floured he would never see his wife again if he left her in Embassy CSMALD stated he finally furnished a "cocument of support" in the interest of his wife and the passport was eventually granted. CSWALD stated he was his wife's spensor, and only spensor.

OSUMID stated he might have to mturn to the Seviet Union in about five years in order to take his wife back home to see her relatives. He stated no definite plans have been formulated to this end.

CSWALD finally stated he went ever to Russia for his "own percenal reasons." He said it was a "personal matter" to him. He said "I went, and I came back!" He also said "It was something that I did."

CSUALD declined to furnish the names of his wife's relatives because they are on file in the American Embassy in Messea, and he thinks it "safer for their velices to let the names remain on file there."

During the entire interview, OSMALD appeared to down-grade the possibility the Coviet invelligence service night at any time attempt to use him or obtain any information through him. He agreed to contact the FBI if at any time any individual made any contact of any nature under suspicious circumstances with him. OSMALD stated his employer has no government contracts, and is not engaged in any no reason why the Soviets would desire to contact him; however, he premised his cooperation in reporting to FBI any information coming to his attention.
