Dear Mr. Oswald:

I am pleased to inform you that the Embassy is now in a position to take final action on your wife's visa application. Therefore, you and your wife are invited to come to the Embassy at your convenience when your wife has gathered the documents listed in the attached Form 951-649.

The Embassy has on file two copies of your wife's birth certificates and one copy of her marriage certificate. Therefore, she need bring only one more copy of her marriage certificate, three photographs, an X-ray, serological analysis and registration of measles inoculation.

As you were notified previously, three photographs of your daughter and a copy of her birth certificate will also be necessary for the Consular Report of Birth and the amendment to your passport.

As I mentioned in my last communication, you should request that your (and also Moscow Airport if possible) be designated as your wives in your Soviet child's name.
