INTERNAL SECURITY - RUSSIA

During late afternoon of 5/4/67, Mr. ROBERT STEVEN, the Administrative Assistant to the Ambassador, brought Mr. BERNARD DIEDERICH to my office. Mr. DIEDERICH is the representative in Mexico of Time-Life magazine.

Mr. DIEDERICH explained that his bureau chief at Time-Life headquarters had been pushing him on a lead previously sent down to him relative to a picture which had appeared in a previous issue of Esquire magazine in an article relating to the OSWALD case. That picture was a reproduction of one which had appeared in the Warren Report and the sub-caption was to the effect that "this was not OSWALD." The Esquire article, with which the Bureau is undoubtedly familiar, stated that this picture had been furnished to the FBI in Dallas by CIA on the day of President KENNEDY's assassination. The Time-Life bureau chief had instructed DIEDERICH to ascertain in Mexico the facts concerning this photo.

Mr. STEVEN explained that Mr. DIEDERICH felt that to satisfy his bureau chief he should make inquiries concerning this matter with the Embassy and Mr. STEVEN, therefore, brought him to my office.
