

Shaw Presses Garrison for Details of 'Plot'

NEW ORLEANS (AP)—Attorneys for Clay L. Shaw want Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison to provide them with times, dates and places concerning an alleged conspiracy to kill President Kennedy.

Shaw has been indicted by the Orleans Parish grand jury on a charge of conspiring to kill Kennedy, who was assassinated in Dallas in the Nov. 22, 1963. Garrison brought the original charge.

Criminal Dist. Judge Edward A. Haggerty presides over a hearing today at which Shaw's lawyers will seek to quash the indictment, to obtain a bill of particulars listing the dates, times and places, and to have the defendant's belongings returned to him.

33 Subpoenaed

Garrison, who disagrees with the Warren Commission findings that Lee Harvey Oswald acted alone in the slaying, maintains Shaw, David Ferrie of New Orleans, Jack Ruby and Oswald conspired in the killing. Ruby, Ferrie and Oswald are dead.

Thirty-three persons have been subpoenaed for the hearing, including seven criminal district judges. Also subpoenaed were Garrison, the 12 grand jurors who indicted Shaw, and organizers of Truth and Consequences, Inc., of New Orleans.

The organization is composed of businessmen who are financing Garrison's investigation.

In another development, John Cancler, a convicted burglar, said the charges against him would have been dropped had he agreed to "cooperate" with Garrison's probe, United Press International reported.

Tells of Offer

(Newsweek magazine said yesterday the "cooperation" Cancler had been asked for by Garrison's office involved planting evidence in the apartment of Shaw.

(A second convicted burglar, Miguel Torres, told Newsweek that Garrison promised to help get his sentence reduced if he would testify to an assassination conspiracy involving Shaw, Oswald and Ferrie. Torres, the magazine said, told them Garrison tried to "teach" him dates and names of persons supposedly involved in the plot.

(The New York Times said today that Torres, a former heroin addict, was offered his freedom from prison, an ounce of heroin and a three-month vacation in Florida if he would "cooperate" in Garrison's investigation.)

The Times quoted Cancler as saying that after he refused to break into Shaw's home Garrison's staff stepped up its prosecution against him.
