Court Orders U.S. Yield Data of JFK Autopsy

General Sessions Court Judge Charles W. Halleck yesterday ordered the Government to provide the X-rays and photographs of President John F. Kennedy's autopsy for use as evidence in the New Orleans conspiracy trial of Clay L. Shaw.

The action came after the Justice Department declined to permit the 22 X-rays and 45 photographs in the U.S. Archives here to be studied by Dr. Cyril H. Wecht, a pathologist and witness for the prosecution. Judge Halleck Friday set a deadline of 4 p.m. yesterday for the Government to voluntarily permit study of the autopsy material.

Justice Department has fought attempts by District Attorney Jim Garrison to obtain the evidence, arguing that the Kennedy family and the Government had contracted to keep the material secret.

James B. Rhoads, U.S. archivist, was ordered to "attend and testify" at the trial, and to take autopsy materials and other evidence, on 48-hour notice.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Joseph M. Hannon said the order will be appealed to the U.S. Court of Appeals "first thing" this morning. The 48-hour notice acts as a minimum two-day stay of Judge Halleck's order, giving the U.S. Court of Appeals time to rule on it.

Numa V. Bertel, assistant New Orleans district attorney, said yesterday the autopsy and other assassination items might be presented on Thursday or Friday.

Other items ordered taken to the trial as evidence include the assassination rifle, bullet fragments, a "spent pellet" and X-rays of former

Texas Gov. John B. Connally's wounds.

New Orleans District Attorney Jim Garrison apparently wants the autopsy materials to support his contention that President Kennedy was shot from in front of the motorcade as well as behind and that the assassination was the work of more than one man.

In his order yesterday, Judge Halleck specified that the rifle could not be tested and none of the evidence changed "in form or content" in any way.

He received a telegram earlier in the day from New Orleans District Court Judge Edgar A. Haggerty Jr., assuring him the evidence would remain in the custody of the archivist, not given to District Attorney Garrison's office, until submitted in evidence.

Judge Halleck originally proposed letting Dr. Wecht study the autopsy materials here, because he said he feared a wholesale disclosure of pictures and X-rays might end up with them appearing "on the cover of Life magazine," as he once phrased it.
