Assassination of President John F. Kennedy

 WASHINGTON (UPI) -- THE HOUSE ASSASSINATION COMMITTEE HAS TURNED UP SOME SENSITIVE NEW LEADS IN THE SLAYINGS OF PRESIDENT JOHN KENNEDY AND MARTIN LUTHER KING. IT WANTS 980 QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

"WE HAVE TURNED UP LEADS WE WILL PURSUE," SAID REP. THOMAS DOWNING, D-VA., THE CHAIRMAN. "THERE ARE 600 QUESTIONS IN THE KING MATTER AND 380 IN THE KENNEDY MATTER."

DOWNING MADE THE DISCLOSURE AFTER THE COMMITTEE TENTATIVELY APPROVED A 10-PAGE REPORT ON ITS INVESTIGATIONS DURING 1976 WHICH WILL BE PUBLISHED AS SOON AS THE CLERK OF THE HOUSE RECEIVES IT.

DURING A FINAL, CLOSED MEETING FRIDAY, STAFF MEMBERS WERE ASKED TO LEAVE THE ROOM SO STAFF DIRECTOR RICHARD SPRAGUE COULD DISCUSS ONE DELICATE AREA OF FUTURE INVESTIGATIONS WITH COMMITTEE MEMBERS.

NEITHER SPRAGUE NOR DOWNING WOULD DISCUSS SPECIFICS. COMMITTEE SOURCES, HOWEVER, SAY WITNESSES HAVE BEEN IDENTIFIED WHO CAN SHED NEW LIGHT ON A BULLET FOUND ON A STRETCHER IN PARKLAND MEMORIAL HOSPITAL IN DALLAS WHERE KENNEDY WAS TAKEN AFTER BEING SHOT ON NOV. 22, 1963.

THE MYSTERIOUS BULLET SPARKED THEORIES A SECOND GUNMAN FIRED AT KENNEDY'S MOTORCADE.

 WASHINGTON (UPI) -- A STUDY PANEL SET UP TO SUGGEST WAYS THE HOUSE CAN IMPROVE ITS OPERATIONS AS WELL AS PUBLIC IMAGE SAID FRIDAY IT HAS HIRED THE LOU HARRIS POLLING FIRM TO SURVEY PUBLIC ATTITUDES TOWARD CONGRESS.

REP. DAVID OBEY, D-WIS., CHAIRMAN OF THE COMMISSION ON ADMINISTRATIVE REVIEW, SAID LOUIS HARRIS AND ASSOCIATES OF NEW YORK WAS RETAINED TO GET "THE VIEWS OF THE PUBLIC ON A NUMBER OF IMPORTANT ISSUES FACING THE CONGRESS, INCLUDING ETHICAL STANDARDS, WHAT JOBS THEY EXPECT THEIR ELECTED REPRESENTATIVES TO PERFORM ON THEIR BEHALF AND WHAT KINDS OF RESOURCES THEY FEEL ARE NECESSARY IF THEIR REPRESENTATIVES ARE TO PERFORM THOSE JOBS ADEQUATELY."

A COMMISSION SPOKESMAN SAID A CONTRACT WITH THE HARRIS FIRM IS STILL BEING NEGOTIATED BUT THAT THE ESTIMATED COST OF THE SURVEY WOULD BE ABOUT \$50,000.
