I, James R. Malley, being duly sworn, hereby make the following free and voluntary statement to Inspectors J. Allison Conley and Edgar N. Best, who have identified themselves to me and whom I know to be Inspectors with the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

On November 22, 1963, I held the position of Number One Man to then Assistant Director Alex Rosen of the General Investigative Division. On Sunday, November 24, at approximately 2:15 PM, I received instructions to proceed to Dallas, Texas, to look after the Bureau's interests in connection with the investigation relating to the assassination of President Kennedy. I arrived at the Dallas, Texas, Office at approximately 8:00 PM that evening. I worked in the Dallas Office the remainder of Sunday and up until approximately 4:30 PM Monday morning, at which time I went to my hotel room to clean up and have a very short nap and returned to the office at 7:00 AM. I then worked continuously until 8:00 AM on Tuesday morning before returning to my hotel. The reason for the long hours at this period was the fact that the Bureau desired a fairly comprehensive nemorandum covering the results of the investigation of the assassination of President Kennedy as well as a memorandum covering investigation of Oswald's shooting by Jack Ruby. The instructions were that these two memoranda were to be prepared/on a plane en route to Washington, D. C.

by Tuesday morning. During this period I was charged with the responsibility of seeing that these memoranda were promptly and accurately prepared and worked closely with the Special Agent in Charge and other personnel of the Dallas Office along with Seat of Government Supervisors Richard D. Rogge and Fletcher Thompson, who had arrived in Dallas on Monday morning at approximately 4:30 or 5:00.

From that time until the Warren Commission was established I remained in Dallas actively supervising the investigation of the assassination case as well as the Ruby case. To the best of my recollection I reformed to Washington on December 12, 1963. At no time did I ever hear of Oswald having visited the Dallas Office or bringing a note to the Dallas Office for Special Agent Hosty until I read an article in the Washington Post sometime in late August or early September, 1975.

At no time during the period that I was in Dallas, Texas, did I attend any conferences at which there was any discussion concerning a note that had been delivered to the Dallas Office by Oswald and there has been no discussion on my part with anyone since that time until today.

I have read each of the two pages of this affidavit and it is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and recollection.
